NOVI ELECTS TWO MEMBERS TO SCHOOL BOARD

Frazer Staman and Mrs. Harry Watson were elected trustees to the Novi School Board in the Annual Election held Monday.

A total of 152 votes were cast in the election. This is slightly less than the record of 215 votes cast in last year's election. Staman, seeking reelection to the Board, received the highest number of votes with 125. Mrs. Watson was elected with a total of 110 votes. Jack Crawford, the third candidate for the Board, received 52 votes.

Both Staman and Mrs. Watson were elected for three year terms on the Board.

POTATO GROWERS ASKED TO MAIL FORMS THIS WEEK

This is the week for Oakland County potato growers to mail their ballots in the referendum being taken by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on whether to continue or stop Marketing Order 60, which regulates the marketing of potatoes produced in Michigan, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Minnesota, northern Iowa and northern Indiana. This reminder comes from Walter Cook, chairman of the Oakland County committee of the Production and Marketing Administration.

Ballots have been mailed to every potato grower who produced potatoes for market in 1950. With the ballot are simple instructions and a self-addressed envelope which will carry the signed ballot to R. E. Keller, official of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Chicago, who acts as agent of the Secretary of Agriculture in conducting the referendum. Any grower who failed to receive a ballot may obtain one from the county PMA committee office.

Mr. Cook points out that in a referendum on the marketing order conducted last fall, favored by the growers three to one, the marketing order was tied in with price support for potatoes. In the present referendum, however, only the marketing order is being voted on, because price support has been discontinued by Order of Congress.

Larro Holstein Cow Sets New Record

A state production record has been made by a registered Holstein-Friesian cow owned by Larro Research Farm, Detroit, according to The Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Larro Charlotte is the new champion, taking the lead for all of Michigan's Senior 4-year-old Holsteins milked 2 times daily in the Pasture Test-Monthly Division with the production of 749 pounds of butterfat from 19,078 pounds of 3.5% milk.

Qualifications for the Ten-Months Division of the Advanced Registry include special culling requirements in addition to high production records. These requirements are intended to place emphasis on reproductive qualities as well as productive ones.

Testing was supervised by Michigan State College, in cooperation with The Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Roadside Market Plans Available

With the fresh fruit and vegetable season arriving, many Michigan growers are beginning to sell their products at the roadside. Success of this retailing method depends greatly upon appearance and arrangement of the market.

Michigan State College receives many requests for roadside market plans. A new set of three sheets of working drawings has been prepared by the departments of horticulture and agricultural engineering. One drawing shows construction of markets suitable for operators with small volume. The other two sheets show construction of a larger unit.

Plans for the roadside market are available at a cost of 20 cents for each sheet to cover processing costs. Address the Department of Agricultural Engineering, Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan.

Holstein Cow Sets New Milk Production Record

Wascots Bessie Fayne, a registered Holstein cow in the herd of Wayne County Training School, Northville, has further added to her outstanding lifetime production of more than 100,000 pounds of milk. Her production records are officially recorded by The Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

In 8 yearly milking periods, this cow has produced a total of 108,148 pounds of milk and 3,719 pounds of butterfat. Her highest single record was made at the age of 8 years and 2 months when she produced 15,453 pounds of milk and 529 pounds of butterfat.

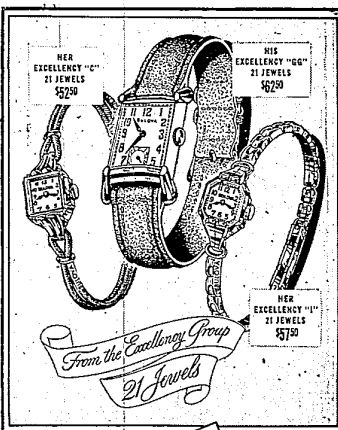

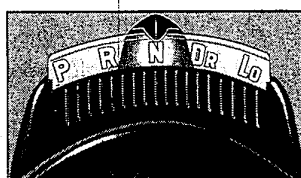
