Township Zoning Ordinance. It is being added in the form of phone calls to The Enterprise by aroused citizens asking what can be done to stop the moving of old buildings onto properly adjacent to their homes. They have a right to be aroused and they have a right to ask. "What Can Be Done?" Some of these citizens were not particularly concerned about zoning until it struck close to home. This is only natural, but it does serve as a warning to others that unless zoning is enacted these instances will increase. The next one may be in your neighborhood.

There are no specific restrictions in the ordinance on the moving of dwellings in the township. In fact, it is not necessarily undesirable, If the dwellings are sound and are properly repaired and finished. Under the ordinance this must be done, dependent upon the zone it is in. It must conform to certain height and square feet of space requirements as well as location on the property. These are not restrictions, they are protective factors to insule the health and safety of all of the residents as well as maintain the value of property in the neighborhood.

"What Can Be Done?" As long as the Township remains unzoned, little can be done. Farmington Township is the only township in this area that does not have some type of protection. However, the property owners do have the opportunity of adding strength to the proposed ordinance. They can do it by contacting members of the Zoning Board and the Township Board and insisting that the ordinance be enacted. They can discuss it in their neighborhoods and attend the public meetings of the Zoning Board.
