"SHARE THE BOOK" PLAN BEGAN BY U-M DEAN OF SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

A "share the book" plan has been started in the University of Michigan School of Education with professors providing the books and the students doing most of the sharing.

At the urging of Dean J. B. Edmonson, faculty members have

been clearing their shelves, of books, bulletins, and reprints dealing with educational topics. These items have been placed on tables in the School of Education building, labeled, "Free Material," and interested students are invited to help themselves.

Dean Edmonson believes that the idea of sharing books with others might well be taken up by communities where there are many people who would welcome an opportunity to possess books now gathering dust on the shelves of others. "Sharing books" might be sponsored by churches, service clubs, the Grange, or by business firms, the Dean points out.

"There are doubtless scores of young people in many towns and neighborhoods who would be delighted to secure books that have long since ceased to be of any value to the original owner," Dean Edmonson explains. "Sharing knowledge with others is common, and sharing books is an extension of that."

MSC Researchers Leave For Alaska

Three Michigan State College scientists will leave for Alaska on August 1 to begin a new research project for the U. S. Navy.

They are Dr. Gerald W. Prescott, professor of botany and plant pathology, and graduate students William C. Vinard, Diver Pines, California, and George H. Lauff, Milan.

Dr. Prescott was granted \$3,519.50 by the Office of Naval Research to investigate algae in the fresh water of Navy petroleum reserves at Point Barrow, Alaska. The study is the first of its type conducted by the navy.

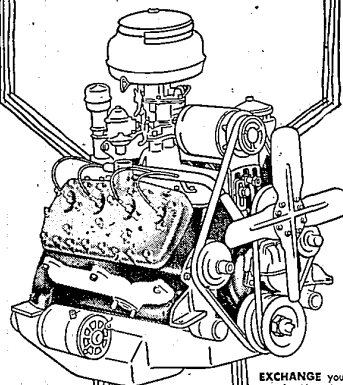
