

SEEK VOLUNTEERS FOR POLIO WORK IN COUNTY

An urgent appeal is being made in the Farmington area for volunteers to help polio victims. It was announced this week by Carl V. Donelson, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Donelson stated that women who are 21 years of age, in good health and with no small children are urgently needed to aid polio victims in Oakland County. Training courses are now being held and more volunteers are needed. The program is under the sponsorship of the National Foundation and volunteers are being trained by staff members of St. Joseph's Hospital in Pontiac. The training is in the non-professional but very important duties related to the care of polio patients. Anyone interested in volunteering for this work is urged to contact Pierre Delmonter at Farmington 1421.

Workmen Raze Old Farmington Landmark On Grand River

Another landmark has been erased from Farmington's main street with the razing of Karl's Tailor's shop next to the Precise Tool Company on Grand River.

Workmen tore down the structure last week and will fill in where the foundation was and level the ground. Karl has moved his tailoring and dry cleaning business to 33302 Seven Mile Road. He had rented the small building, which was owned by the city, for several years.

The building was ordered repaired or torn down by the State Fire Marshall several months ago. The City investigated the possibility of repairing the building in compliance with the directive from the State Fire Marshall, but found it too expensive for the value of the structure.

The City Council has discussed the possibility of constructing a driveway on the property where the shop stood to give access onto Grand River from the city-owned parking lot in rear of the property. Karl's shop was one of seven buildings ordered repaired or torn down by the Fire Marshall. The recommendations were presented to the city and the building owners following a series of inspections throughout the city's business area.

casting about for five men to appoint to the new board, which was ordered by the 1951 legislature. Williams said a new agency like this should be independent of other commissions so "it will not be hampered by old ideas."

A new experiment at MSC shows that a college-industry training program can cut the training period for new plant foremen from six months to one month. Officials say the four-week course substitutes for the "trial-and-error" method usually used in promoting machinists to foremen.

Michigan State College now is also giving a two-week summer course in truck driving. Expected for the course are 650 enrollees, which will be repeated several times each year.

The Michigan State Police have started 26 more recruits through training school, planning to graduate them by September 7. The shortage of state policemen since the end of World War II is easing up. This is the 10th post-war class and the third in which married men have been accepted.

The Migrant problem arises again in Michigan. The influx of workers for the fruit and berry orchards this year is greater than ever and the usual difficulties present themselves. Housing is a principal issue, although many farmers provide make-shift quarters on the farms.

Law enforcement is another major problem. In the Traverse City area the State Liquor Control Commission has banned the sale of liquor in pints and of wine of more than 16 per cent alcoholic content until August 15.

The Benton Harbor area may consider similar restrictions during the heavy peach and apple picking season.

Edgar Burger Receives Scholastic Honor At MSC

Edgar P. Burger, Farmington, senior in science and arts, was one of 73 Michigan State College students who received all A's during the spring term. This is the highest scholastic honor obtainable.

Each term a banquet is given in their honor by Pres. John A. Hannah. The students will be feted at the beginning of the fall term.

Three licenses have been sold for taking mussels on the St. Joseph River this summer, conservation records show. These are the first such licenses to be issued since 1949 when mussel license sales totaled three for the Grand River. In the 1930's, when interest in taking mussels reached a peak, sales totaled as high as 2,400 licenses for one year. Mussel shells are used for buttons.

State Represented In Lake Erie Fisheries Work

Michigan will be represented on a committee being formed to coordinate fisheries work in Lake Erie, conservation officials have announced.

Formation of the "Lake Erie Fisheries Management Committee" was the result of a meeting held in Toledo at the invitation of Ohio fisheries men to discuss fisheries problems in Lake Erie. Representatives of New York, Pennsylvania and Ontario, in addition to those from Ohio and Michigan, attended and will have membership on the committee.

It is expected that the committee will meet annually to promote coordination of fisheries work done on the lake in relation to commercial and sport fishing, biological lake studies and water pollution.

The nation's armed services will use close to 5 million tons of coal for heat and power in the current year.

Women's Clubs To Study Conservation July 20-22

Representatives of Michigan business and Professional Women's clubs will study conservation correlated with health and safety at their July session at the conservation training school.

Clubs throughout the state will be represented at the meeting, but the majority of members attending will be from southeastern Michigan.


