U-M Study Shows Industry's Attitude Towards Michigan

Industry comes to Michigan and stays, according to a survey of 400 Michigan manufacturers for definite and determinable reasons.

These reasons are set down in a careful study just issued by the Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan and a task force of the Michigan Economic Development Commission for which the survey was made.

The survey conclusions were compiled from personal interviews with a representative sample of Michigan manufacturers. Of 200 industrialists interviewed last year, 12 said they have been considering moving all or part of their plant to another state. A dozen more were considering expansion of their plants outside Michigan.

The survey concludes that this indicated no serious threat and says that the loss, if it should occur, would be more than compensated by the construction of new plants and the movement of industry into Michigan. However, many industrialists who do not consider moving still have many complaints and say the reports of a major cause for not planning to move a plant is a general state of inertia rather than the advantages of plant location in Michigan over alternative locations.

Advantages of a Michigan location most frequently mentioned by manufacturers are:

1. Nearness to markets; particularly to the automotive plants.
2. The availability of labor personnel with highly specialized skills.
3. The presence of a labor force

In a recent issue we talked about Lloyd Croft and his light sandy field which has been doing very well with proper liming, manure and fertilizer practices. It is true that on this type of soil it takes a little more investment to get the production, but it is being done.

Following my visit with Mr. Croft, I had occasion to make another call later that week and to assist in the setting up of a management program on a farm in northern Oakland County. One of the comments that really hit home in talking with the farmer was the fact that he came up with the statement concerning his neighbor's production and his own. He couldn't understand why his neighbor did so well when "After all, there is just a fence between them." Again, that points right back to good planning for long range management of the soil. The crops that are taken off and the rotation program will determine the length of life of any field, no matter how good or how poor the soil.

It is more than a tree that you can "corner" a field to death. Farmers who are working in the Soil Conservation District program are beginning to see the effects of long range planning. I think any farmer should investigate the assistance he can get from the Soil Conservation District to get the best yields from his farm that is possible.

EXTENSION PROBLEMS
 One of the problems in Extension work is to find time to get everything done that you feel should be done. Nowadays, even with more agents in the field, it is still very tough to keep up with everything that is going on. One of the big problems is making farm contacts on individual farms. For those folks who would desire a farm call, here are the agents in charge of this work:

Bill Rossmann, Assistant County Agricultural Agent, is in charge of fruit and vegetable work in the county and also works with the folks in the cities and towns on lawn and garden problems.

As for myself, I am responsible for the farm program in dairying, livestock, crops and soils, also radio and newspaper work.

If you have some special problems that require help with this, don't hesitate to call on either Bill or myself and we will endeavor to make a farm contact as soon as possible. We are usually scheduled ahead two to three weeks for these calls, so we don't make too many calls without having a reason. We will be glad to help any one that we can whenever they let us know.

4-H PROGRAM STRESSES TRACTOR MAINTENANCE

Facing a shortage of farm labor, curtailed supply of equipment and need for greater production of food and fiber, 4-H members in Michigan and 46 other states are stressing efficient operation of farm tractors, according to G. L. Noble, director of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

In the 14 Central states, 22,000 members are receiving training in the 1951 4-H Tractor Maintenance program, in which they learn to service their tractors and operate them safely, Noble said. The program is being conducted in those states by the Cooperative Extension Service for the eighth consecutive year.

Medals, trips and scholarships are provided in the Central states by the Standard Oil Company (Indiana), which also allocates funds for expenses of volunteer local 4-H Club leaders who attend training clinics.

Seven other oil companies provide similar awards in their respective territories throughout the U. S. Total value of awards and leader training funds offered by the eight donors for 1951 will exceed \$100,000.

Improved State Dairy Methods Result In Greater Milk Production

A two-quart bucket was large enough to hold the daily production of the average dairy cow in the United States back in George Washington's day.

But in Michigan in June, 1951, it was a far different story. A twelve-quart water bucket would be running over before "Bosile" gave out the last two quarts of her daily average production.

Gerard Quackenbush, MSC agricultural economist, finds the average Michigan cow on June 1 produced 27.4 pounds of milk. That's about 14 quarts.

Michigan herd production, reported by the federal-state cooperative service, showed the average dairy cow in the state was second in production only to New York's cows. Michigan's average cow would stand right along side of those from Wisconsin, recognized as "America's Dairyland," and produce pound for pound in milk.

Average production in both states was 27.4 pounds per cow. Michigan State College, agricultural authorities credit better breeding management, feeding and more "know-how" on the part of the dairymen for the great strides

dairy production has made since George Washington's day. New findings through agricultural research annually bring forth new ideas that allow fewer cows to produce more milk for more people each decade, MSC officials contend.
