Officers elected: Garret Becker, clerk; Sergius P. Lyon and Benjamin Pierson, deacons, and Rev. Chauncey W. Kulickbaker, pastor.

Copies of the first constitution still extant disclose that regular meetings were held once in three months, the day or evening previous to the celebration of communion. It was decided that each member should pay "the sum of 10 cents quarterly; for any incidental expenses, or for any use that the Church may desire."

Minutes of the meeting of the Union Society held at the same time show that Mr. Kulickbaker was its clerk and Mr. Becker a trustee. Other Union officers were: Chauncey W. Greene, chairman; J. B. Webster, teller, and Joshua Simmons, Harrison Philbrick and Lawrence W. Simmons, trustees.

Others of the Green, Webster, Simmons and Philbrick families were members of the new First Universalist Church.

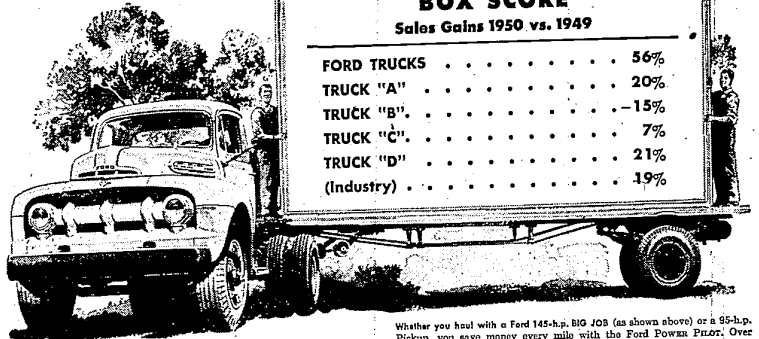
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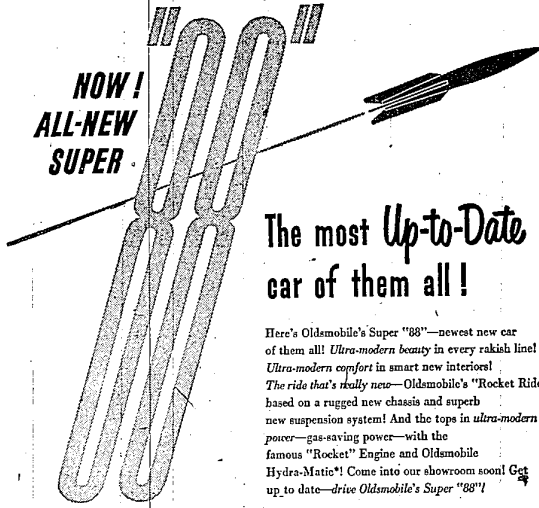
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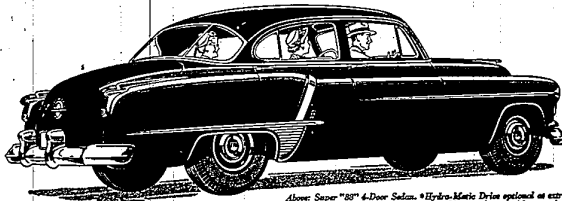
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
