The property on the east side of Oxford Street, formerly owned by the Ford Foundation, Botoford Inn is located on the same parcel of land.

The objectors at Tuesday's meeting have one week in which to insure the presence of all objectors at next Wednesday's meeting. About 95% of the frontageholders have signed the petition. Probate Judge Arthur Moore told the present Tuesday that enough objectors must appear at Wednesday's meeting to reduce to less than 65% the number of property owners favoring the special assessment district. Unless that many objectors are raised, the petition asking for the project must stand.

OPEN BOND BIDS

The Thompson Company was the only bidder for the purchase of approximately \$20,000 in revenue bonds for the construction of additions to the Woodbine subdivision water system.

The subdivision, located on the north side of 10 Mile Road between Middlebelt and Inkster, has established its own community water system by setting up a special assessment district to defray the cost.

STATE OIL PERMITS DWINDLE TO 76% OF NORMAL

At a time when increased Michigan oil production would be most welcome, the conservation department reports the number of drilling permits issued is down about 24 per cent as compared to last year at this time.

According to department geologists, 359 permits have been issued in contrast to 470 through this period last year. Definite well completion figures are not available, but will follow the declining trend of permits.

However, drillers have stepped up their pace of test or exploratory drilling to ferret out logical oil hunting areas by about 22 percent. Records show 230 test well permits as compared to 181 before Michigan oil fields, averaging nearly 40,000 barrels daily, have been producing at a "maximum of efficient rate" for some time and could not contribute added production to meet any national emergency without causing underground waste. The state's current rate of consumption amounts to about 250,000 barrels a day, or over six times the present producing rate of Michigan fields.

Present United States production is over 6,000,000 barrels a day.

July Gives State Parks Rough Time

It's all over now, a number of state park managers are hoping as they continue digging out and cleaning the damage inflicted by intermittent July rainstorms.

The old flash squalls have been trying the patience of visitors and conservation department park men alike. At the start of the busiest time of the camping season, some of the campers have shown a dogged determination to stick it out. Not a few went through a real test of their ability to rough it. Nearly all affected parks border on Great Lakes.

At Holland park, 35 to 40 mile an hour winds leveled tents and signs, and tossed branches and debris on more than one occasion during July. Story at Grand Haven park is similar with high-powered winds ripping tents and rains pelting bedding and clothing. Harrisville park manager reports one of the worst series of Lake Huron storms to punch away at the park washed up many logs from the lake bottom on to the beach.

Tents were as much as a foot under water for a time at East Tawas park. Flash storms with 20 mile an hour winds were responsible for one good thing at Bay City park, however. Mucky wastes that have bothered bathers on this Lake Huron beach for several years were washed from the sand.

Upper peninsula park rangers at Gogebic Lake park got a lot of exercise in pulling cars out of the mud, but even the tractors frequently bogged down in the clay. Campers literally were washed out of their tents and jammed park restrooms to keep dry. Rangers were leery of walking the campgrounds area, with campers from all sides voicing their objections to the weather.

Warren Dunes on Lake Michigan also has had a series of squalls which have discouraged visitors. At Hocht park, the on and off rains reduced the number of campers to seven, which park manager Perris Wheeler attempted to refuse in his own home.

Bow and arrow season repeats October 1 to November 5. Archers can take either sex deer in all except the counties and parts of Bay and Huron in which they are restricted to bucks only. These nine counties are Keweenaw, Dickinson, Houghton, Menominee, Eagle, Chippewa, Ontonagon, Charlevoix and Chippewa except Drummond Island.

There is no change in the Michigan county bow season, with either sex whitetails legal targets October 1 through December 15.

Bears may be hunted the year around in most counties. In those counties still on the protected list, the regular open season dates are November 15 to 30, same as for regular deer season.

Either gun or bow and arrow may be used. In protected list counties, bears may be hunted by bow or October 1 to November 5, same as for regular archery deer season.
