Find Record Size Bigtooth Aspen

A record-size bigtooth aspen has been discovered on the Earl Wette farm south of Owosso by Extension department district forester Elton Twork.

The tree is 78.5 inches in circumference or 6.5 inches larger than the previous recordholder recognized by the American Forestry Association. The 72-inch aspen is a Michigan tree located in a Copper Range company tract, Ontonagon County.

Although there was no boring of the Wette tree, the age is estimated to be at least 70 to 80 years. Aspen, considered of little commercial importance only a few years ago, now is an important pulpwood species.

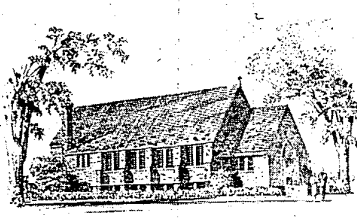
