A blue Monday it is as we sit down to thumb out this week's column on the typewriter. Ordinarily, just getting on the phone "news hunting" has been a wonderful tonic for forgetting any personal doldrums we might be in. But today, everything is sad; so you'd better skip us this week if you want to stay in a cheery mood!

Tragedy struck our neighborhood last week end. A fishing boat explosion near Caseville, Michigan, took the life of our neighbor George Johnson of Belfast Street. Father of seven year old Larry and nine year old Sandra Johnson, he was only 30 years old and a very well-liked young man. Although they have lived in our vicinity only a year, the Johnsons' name is well known, and the hearts of many are torn by this sadness. He was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Johnson of Bedford.

The Johnsons had stayed for a third week at Caseville vacationing. Their daughter Candy was with her grandparents in Bedford and son Larry had returned home from Caseville a few days before the accident with their Middlebelt Road neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Hawley, who had been vacationing with them. Friday morning, Mrs. Johnson was ready to return home after a wonderful vacation, but Mr. Johnson urged that they go out fishing "just once more."

Trouble with the motor caused Mr. Johnson, an engineer, to be called to that end of the boat just as the explosion occurred. Mr. Johnson's death a day later was the result of lung injuries from the flames. Had he lived, doctors reported that he would have been a cripple, for he was badly burned. Several other persons were seriously injured.

Another neighbor's death was that of Archie R. Wright, who lived with his wife for the past several years at the home of their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Watwood of 2218 Middle-

speaking by heavy trucks on Grand River. The Manager was directed to proceed with the hiring of an additional man.

Letich also recommended that the city install its own bulk gasoline tank. He pointed out that the city can save six cents per gallon on gasoline by installing their own tank. There is no cost to the city to have the tank installed. The Council directed the Manager to go ahead with the signing of the contract. Letich also recommended that water meters be installed on the city well pumps to keep a continual check on the amount of water used and to aid in determining any wastage that may occur.

A study is being made also of the west rooms in the City Park in an effort to reduce vandalism. Bids have been received on the installation of metal doors so they can not be broken into.

Paul Pate, City Attorney, appeared before the Council to discuss the procedures in the drafting of new ordinances regarding city services and establishment of city policy.

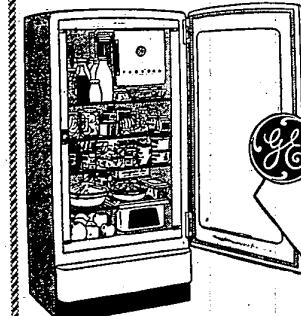
