



City Reminds Taxpayers Of September 1 Deadline

Notices are being mailed this week to City residents reminding them of the September 1 deadline for the payment of city taxes. Kathryn Cotter, treasurer, announced this week.

Mrs. Cotter stated Monday that approximately 50% of the taxes have been paid to date. Taxes may be paid up to September 1 without penalty at the City Treasurer's office in the County Treasurer's office in Pontiac.

From September 1 to November 1 are subject to a 2% penalty, and from November 1 to March 1 a 4% penalty. After March 1 city taxes must be paid at the County Treasurer's office in Pontiac.

distributed to license dealers. Those intending to hunt deer of either sex December 1-5 in the north-eastern cherry country or antlerless deer December 1-10 in Allouan County must hold a permit in addition to the regular license.

An above average yield per acre for all Michigan field crops has been predicted by the federal-state crop reporting service. Yield for hay and potatoes may be the highest on record.

There are 40,000 Federal employees in Michigan. Divided by 83, it works out to nearly 500 Federal employees per county. What on earth can they find to do?
