Huge Woodward Avenue Parade To Open Michigan State Fair

A big parade down Detroit's Woodward Avenue Friday at 11 a.m. will start off the activities of the 100th Michigan State Fair, a ten day event through September 9.

Leading the parade and participating in opening ceremonies on the Fairgrounds at 12:30 p.m. Friday will be Governor G. Mennen Williams and Bob Hope, who will entertain in the Coliseum in afternoon and evening shows Friday and Saturday.

Also on opening day and continuing through Saturday, September 8, will be a mammoth wild west rodeo, plus Indians, before the grandstand featuring a real cowboy and champion horse in "Wild Bill Elliott and his horse Thunder". Elliott is the Red Ryder of the movies.

In the past several years, everything will be ready on opening day. A full program of free entertainment will begin almost simultaneously with the cutting of the ribbon at the main gate.

The Music Shell program the first day will include band concerts by seven high school organizations, square dancing in the Old Timers' Grove, dance revues, organ concerts and nationally popular entertainers in the evening. Similar free programs will continue daily throughout the ten days.

The Coliseum show for the entire State Fair will include the rodeo, plus in addition to Bob Hope for the first two days. Marilyn Maxwell will be there from September 2 through 5 and the Ink Spots from September 6 through 8.

The Clifford Bailey family of Fourteen Mile Road spent Sunday with the Warren Banfield family.

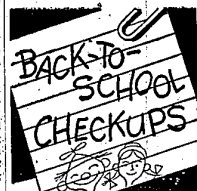
