Church Progresses

Notes From Baptist Church History
Mark Growth Of Organization

A short story, seemingly from modern times, can be read in the records dated May 31, 1873: "People met in covenant meeting" turned into a business meeting. Voted to paint the meeting house.

February 25, 1874, Elder J. S. Bloomer became Pastor and served three years. It was at this time that a reunion was held and letters were received from former Pastors J. H. Itasca, Wm. B. Grow, J. S. Joyden and W. B. Northrup. That year first full report recorded was sent to the Association at Walter Lake. Quite an important step was taken April 25, 1874, at the Covenant meeting: the Sisters were invited to remain at the close of the exercises and consult about organizing a "Women's Missionary Circle," which invitation was accepted by all women present.

In 1875 a new barn was built at the parsonage and a new Sunday School Library was installed. In 1876 a new organ was purchased by the help of Brother Truman Nichols.

The pulpit in the afternoons of 1877 was supplied for several weeks by Rev. C. D. Reynolds. The next year the Rev. George Crocker served as pastor. In 1878 Brother T. H. Teal was ordained. The records say they had an abundant harvest.

Teal served for two years. August 30 of that year the Evangelical Society was allowed to use our church for three months while their church was being built. Rental fee was \$25 for the year.

A Sunday School Institute, under the instruction of Brother Hills, Assistant Sunday School Superintendent, assisted by Brother Edmonds and others, was held March 10 and 11, 1879. Delegates from six schools attended. A picnic was enjoyable and a courageous thing happened during this month — a lady was asked not to sing in the choir any more, the reason not given! "I moved," we know now why or where.

Brother Newkirk had the distinction of being the first one to be baptized in our new baptistry.

The years 1880-1 were exciting years for the Farmington church. They were cast down, but not destroyed. With the assistance of Reverend T. Shalton, D. D. Walden and Howard, they weathered the storm. That was the first time in many years that only a letter went to the Association.

During the year 1884 six members finished their earthly course, and the next year, the last constituent member died.

In the covenant meeting August 29, 1885, the envelope system was adopted and a collection taken every Sabbath for the Pastor's support. In 1885 the Baptist-Society had charge of the dining hall at the Farmington Fair and netted \$44.51 which was turned over to Pastor Marvin and in 1886, \$74 was cleared the same way. During this year a tent was made and socials were held on the church lawn for the same purpose.

It was voted at the February 5, 1887 covenant meeting, to allow Mr. Smith the use of the church for his singing school for ten evenings. In 1889 the church was reorganized under the new state laws, five trustees were elected, two for one year, two for two years and one for three years.

In 1890 a kitchen was built on the parsonage, size 10 x 12 feet. On July 8, 1892, after the usual covenant meeting, a Women's Missionary Society was re-organized.

In 1892 Elder closed his faithful services of nearly five years. In his "farewell" use of the church for his singing school for ten evenings. In 1892 the church was reorganized under the new state laws, five trustees were elected, two for one year, two for two years and one for three years.

For Salting Meat

There's a technique to seasoning meat! Following meat cookery research, today the when and why is known for salting roasts, chops and steaks for the finest servings.

According to the meat expert Reba Stages, the old rule that a roast should be salted before roasting is now outdated. The truth is a roast may be seasoned before, after, or even during cooking.

This is explained by the fact that salt penetrates to a depth of less than 1/2 inch, therefore, it makes no difference when it is added to a roast.

However, broiled and pan-broiled steaks and chops should be salted after the meat is browned. This is explained by the fact that salt tends to draw the juices out of the meat and thus retard the browning process.

Also in braising, the meat is seasoned after it is browned. In the case where meat is floured before browning, the salt is added to the flour.

State Library Resumes
Services To Public

The Michigan State Library has resumed all services, including filing requests for books and information. The number of books loaned to state employees, libraries and state residents without libraries already exceeds ten thousand per month and is increasing rapidly.

Reading room facilities for patrons are still lacking, however, in Lansing. An information center on the ground floor of the Capitol Building is the only point of public contact for library materials.
