

Practice Ranges Open For Bow Deer Hunters

With the season open only a few weeks away, bow and arrow deer hunters can get in practice shooting at nine southern Michigan archery ranges in conservation department state park and game areas.

The range at the Rose Lake Wildlife Experiment station near Lansing has been expanded to a 25-target course. Roving courses are open to the public at the Swan Creek station near Allegan, Alpena and Pontiac Lake parks, and Barry, Dansville, Port Huron, Three Rivers and Lapeer state game areas.

Local archery clubs cooperate with the department in maintaining facilities.

Regular bow season runs from October 1 to November 5.

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Uncertainty Of World Events Affects Enrollment At University Of Michigan

World affairs continue to give an air of uncertainty to the enrollment at the University of Michigan for this fall.

University officials frankly admit that the best word on the enrollment total will come when the classes start in the Fall Semester on Monday, September 24.

The budget for the coming year is based on an estimated enrollment of 16,000 students. The months that have followed since the budget was prepared have brought some optimism into the Korean portion of the world's problems and officials now believe the enrollment may fall somewhere between 16,000 and 17,000 students.

The military demand for manpower — and the declining birth rate of the early thirties — will affect this fall's enrollment as compared with a year ago. There were 19,487 students last fall taking resi-

dent credit courses. The Medical School is one unit expecting an increase this fall since its freshman class will be increased by fifty students to make a class of 200. University officials believe this will be the largest entering freshman class in any medical school in the country.

The University, which last year awarded 6,393 degrees, will open the Fall Semester with a new president, H. H. Hatcher, vice-president of the Ohio State University, noted educator and author. He will be the eighth person to hold the office. Alexander G. Ruthven retired August 31 after holding the office of president since 1929.

The University will also have four new deans. George Graner Brown of the College of Engineering, Stanley G. Fontana of the School of Natural Resources and Thomas D. Rowe of the College of

Pharmacy all took office July 1. E. P. Fauri has held his post as dean of the newly-created School of Social Work since March 1. The school, formerly the Institute of Social Work, will move its headquarters from Detroit to the campus in Ann Arbor during September.

The College of Pharmacy is heading into an eventful year and plans are under way for an observance of its seventy-fifth anniversary late in October. The college also has arranged with the School of Business Administration for a course in retail store management especially for pharmacy students.

The School of Education also has announced plans for a new curriculum which will involve both classroom work and work at various specialized trades in automotive plants.

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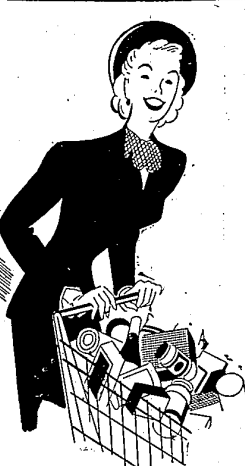
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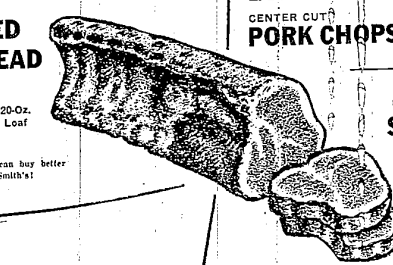
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
