As most of you know, I recently had an occasion to visit at the first hand, the heroic job that is being accomplished at the Elizabeth Kenny Polio Center on Telegraph Road.

It was a little after 10:30 p.m. when I set out our small Eddie at the Center, not quite believing that this disease, dreaded by everyone, had hit our little guy.

When I left, I was told that I was welcome to come back the next day, but that visiting hours were on Wednesday from 7:00 to 5:00 p.m. and from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on Sunday.

I pray this may never happen in your family, but if it should, please be assured that they work long hours at the Center to help each child or older person.

I was later told they worked hours over Eddie that night.

The next day when I arrived, I marveled at the calm, energetic, scientifically trained therapists as they exercised the muscles. Hundreds of packs were being taken to each room and each room was full. On each worker's face was a smile, but they, too, worry and wonder, as the odds are plenty high and not even the wonderful Dr. Edith Calhoun can tell what the ill effects will be at first.

And you wonder when Dr. Calhoun sleeps, as she gives every possible waking hour of her life to the restoration of youthful lives.

On Thursday she told me, as far as polio goes, our worries are over — but our big worry now is his heart trouble.

But life is full of troubles for most of us and I'm getting kind of used to them.

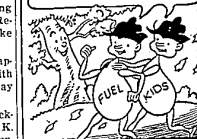
Training at Sampson included character guidance, mathematics, psychological and chemical warfare, customs of the service, drill and other subjects in the intensive indoctrination course.
