for the purchase of a new school bus to Everett Implement Company, the low bidder. The new 20 seat school bus is available for immediate delivery. This gives the District a fleet of 13 school buses.

Revision of the fee schedule for the use of school facilities was also completed. Under the new set-up a \$5 minimum fee will be charged for the use of school classrooms for a three hour period plus a \$1.50 per hour janitorial fee. There will be a charge of \$2.50, including janitorial service, for each hour over the three hour period. A fee of \$20 will be charged for the use of the gym plus janitorial services for three hours or less. The cost above the three hours will be \$5.00 per hour plus janitorial fees. A \$5.00 minimum has been established for rehearsals plus \$1.50 per hour for janitorial service.

Adult groups using the gym for rehearsals will be charged a minimum fee of \$200 plus janitorial services. The use of the kitchen will cost \$10 plus the cost of a kitchen employee, with the use of the lunch room on the same cost schedule as a classroom. The Board approved a motion requiring that no building will be opened without a school employee present.
