Oakland County Chapter Infantile
Paralysis Foundation Aids 76

Seventy-six polio patients have been returned from the far in 1951. Mrs. Ruth W. Marshall, executive secretary, reported at a meeting of the directors of the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis held Wednesday, September 19, in Pontiac. Of this number 46 are patients who have contracted polio previous to 1951. Aid given to these patients has been for hospital care, doctors' services, physical therapy, nursing care and orthopedic appliances.

At the directors' meeting Carl W. Dunelson, chairman of the board, introduced the following new directors: Pierre Delmonter, Farmington; Reverend Dan B. Jorgensen, Clawson; George Eberle, Milford; and Miss Helen Lippisch, Miss Dorothy Shauman and Mrs. Richard Paschke, all of Pontiac.

Raymond A. Tabbs, treasurer, reported that the chapter has spent \$26,353.25 on polio patients, since January 1, 1951. Of this amount, \$15,500.00 was sent to the chapter from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis Headquarters Epidemic Aid Fund.

Mrs. Richard Paschke, chairman of women's activities, reported that committees have been formed in Farmington, Novi and Clawsonville. Women from these committees staffed the National Foundation exhibit at the 4-H Club Fair in August. Twenty-three women completed the Polio Emergency Volunteer course and have worked in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

Mrs. Dunelson announced that the annual March of Dimes campaign will be conducted January 2 to 31, 1952. All funds for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis are from this annual March of Dimes campaign.

Chester Vincent Fleming, Sr., Mr. Fleming, 20121 Antago, Livonia, died at St. Carmel Mercy Hospital, September 22, 1951, from a heart condition.

He was born April 29, 1907, in Detroit and was employed by the Udevis Company.
