## A. A. U. W. Gets Congratulations From State, National Officers

The Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women met last Thursday at the home of Mrs. Alfred Benson, Mrs. Clarence Stoll, local president, read letters of welcome and congratulation to the new branch from state and national presidents.

What are the purposes of A. A. U. W. and who may belong are questions frequently asked. In an attempt to explain the nature of the organization Mrs. Paul Calkins introduced the chairman of the first standing committees: Mrs. Harley Gibson, education; Miss Mary De-

Land, international relations; Mrs. R. M. Granger, social studies; Mrs. Lloyd Smith, status of women; Mrs. Joseph Wolfe, arts; Mrs. Wendell Brown, legislative; and Mrs. George Nahatoll, fellowship; each of whom gave a short resume of the specific nature of their committee. In a broad statement one may say that A. A. U. W. has as its purpose practical educational work and is translated in local groups through a study - action program - study of problems confronting members as individuals or as citizens, action on the basis of study.

An approved degree from an institution approved by the Association is the requirement for A. A. U. W. membership. Requirements for approval, developed through the years, include good academic standards, adequate provision for women students, recognition of women on the faculty and in the administration and a good foundation of general education.

Miss Margaret Cottrell gave a talk on the early beginning of A. A. U. W. which was founded in 1882 in Boston by a group of 17 women from 8 colleges which has now grown to over 111,000 members representing 271 institutions of higher learning.

Miss Ruth Bailey gave a report on the Educational Planning Clinic held in Jackson July 12 which was attended by nine of the local members.

It was voted to send representatives of A. A. U. W. to the United Fund Drive meeting to assist in that work.

Plans were made to sponsor a Cook Book Sale in the near future to raise funds for the Fellowship Fund.

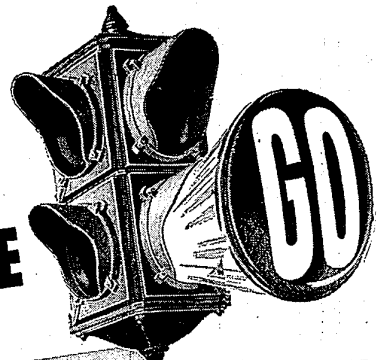
