mercantile in widely separated sections of the Township. Moseman explained that the ordinance provides that a man may build his own home or have it built over a period of five years. He must file plans and a declaration of intention that he will complete 500 square feet the first year and he may live in that completed portion until the rest of the home is finished, provided he completes 20% of the structure each year. In case of economic necessity the owner may appeal to the zoning board for an extension of a year, Moseman added. The chairman stated that the minimum cubic feet requirement in all four residential zones has been lowered. This was done, Moseman added, through suggestions offered by residents attending the various public meetings to make the cubic footage more in proportion to the square footage. Under the new provision, cubic foot minimums are: Residence 1, 6,000 cubic feet; Residence 2, 8,500 cubic feet; Residence 3, 10,500 cubic feet and Residence 4, 13,000 cubic feet.

## Hold Scout Meeting



worth of bonds to be turned over to the bond buyers. This is expected to be accomplished in about ten days. It is possible that the contracts might be awarded next Monday to take effect upon the delivery of the bonds, provided material locations are granted. The Board approved a motion to secure liability and property damage insurance in the amount of \$25,000 to \$50,000 on bodily injury and \$5,000 on property damage per accident. Approval was also given to a motion classifying janitors at Bond, Middlebelt, Noble, Ten Mile, the gymnasium and the High School as custodians with a maximum salary of \$3,000. The Board authorized an increase in substitute teachers salaries to \$12 per day.

The Board moved that the United Fund campaign be authorized to solicit contributions through the employees of the District with one teacher in charge of solicitation. The motion also stated that only one campaign will be authorized and that no publicity be given to individual contributions.
