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Need Clothing  
For Koreans

As the winter winds blow colder, Americans think more and more about warmer clothes, heavy coats and warm gloves, and heat in the furnace.

In Korea cold winds are becoming more and more frequent, too. And ten million people there are destitute. They have no doubt from which to dig out winter clothes. Their homes are masses of rubble. They need clothing, food and shelter.

American Relief for Korea was organized this year and is seeking to collect clothing for Korea. The organization is urging volunteer groups throughout the country to organize local committees for collecting clothes.

Clothing collected should be shipped prepaid to either of American Relief for Korea's two warehouses: The ARK, 5215 Flushing Avenue, Nissequippi, New York; and The ARK, 10901 Russett Street, Oakland, California.

Funds are being sought in the United Campaign for processing the clothes.

"Any clothing, clean and in good condition, is urgently needed," ARK points out. A former worker in Korea said that women particularly need shirts and slacks because most of their housework today consists in cleaning up rubble. Skirts, if sent, should be sturdy, too.

An appeal on behalf of children especially was made recently by Dr. You Chun Yang, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Korea, an honorary chairman of ARK.

"One of the cruellest and most tragic aspects of the carnage and savagery of the Communist war was the plight of the children, who lost their parents and became separated from them in the whirlwind of destruction," he said.

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
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
