CROSS COUNTRY SQUAD CHALKS UP SECOND WIN

Farmington High School's cross country team racked up its second consecutive win of the season when they defeated Hamtramck 27 to 31 at Farmington last Wednesday.

Depth paid off for Coach Harold Hamble's Falcon squad as they picked up finishing in spots 2, 4, 6, 7 and 8 for a 27-point total win.

Hamtramck's Kosowski covered the two mile course in 10:44 for first place and held his team's total to 31.

Bob Mansfield was the first Falcon to finish, copying the number two spot, while Mike Stanek came in fourth, Bud Pressley sixth, John Brunk seventh, Dave Harris eighth, Glen Shaw ninth and Burt Galt tenth. Only the first five men are counted in the score.

The thickets travel to Walled Lake on Thursday, October 11, and entertain Wyandotte here Tuesday, October 16.

State Police Arrest 7,458 During August

During August Michigan State Police made 7,458 arrests, including 6,103 for traffic offenses, according to the department's monthly activity analysis.

Troopers also made 18,304 property inspections and 2,901 liquor inspections. Department vehicles traveled 334,537 miles in all activities.

The East Lansing headquarters identification bureau received 8,023 sets of fingerprints during the month. This brought the number of fingerprints on file to 3,473,550.

There were 612 sets of fingerprints submitted in connection with applications for licenses to carry concealed weapons and 44 of the applicants were found to have criminal records.
