One of this year's projects for Farmington's Town Club is the establishment of a medical closet. A free lending agency, the service will be available to all residents of Farmington City and Township. Miss Helen Pakola, visiting nurse of the Farmington school system, said last week that the need is very great for such a community service and she was happy to hear that the Town Club had already marked it as their next project.

Mrs. Clarence Grubbs of 32230 Nine Mile and Mrs. James D. Mahoney, 31120 Ten Mile, are co-chairmen assigned to the task of planning this project. "The first thing we need is a place for this emergency closet," Mrs. Grubbs stated. "Anyone having any available room for storage of these supplies, in a convenient location, might contact Mrs. Grubbs at 2706-J or Mrs. Mahoney at 2596-W. The club will purchase many of the supplies but hopes to rely mainly on donations of articles from interested Farmington people. Box trays, back stands, heating pads, ice bags, crutches, thermometers, ear syringes, baby cribs and wheel chairs are just a few of the many things needed."

Proceeds from the club's Attic Sale Friday will help establish this new community service. The sale will be held at the Town Hall from noon until nine. Any donations of articles for the medical closet will be welcomed there or will be picked up by contacting the co-chairmen.

## Farmington Schools Close For Institute

Schools of the Farmington Township School District will be closed this Thursday and Friday, October 18 and 19, for the Michigan Education Association Institute.

The third quarter featured the lone touchdown of the game. A Farmington aerial on their own 36 was intercepted by Waterford. A 15 yard penalty against Farmington then took Waterford to the one yard line, where they drove over for the touchdown. The extra point was wide of the goal posts.

Later in the quarter Waterford punted to the Farmington 20 where the intended receiver fumbled the ball. A Falcon and an opponent met in a series of separate snatches for the ball, and a touchback resulted when the Farmington player over down the ball in his own end zone.

In the final quarter, Farmington began to drive into Waterford territory on a series of pass plays, but again their attempt to score was stopped at Waterford's 21 yard line by an interception. The final score stood 8 to 0.

Farmington will play host to Clareville this Friday. The game is scheduled to begin at 2:30 p.m. on Longwood.

## STAR CUTTER CO. COMPLETES MOVE TO NEW LOCATION

The Star Cutter Company, makers of special cutting tools, moved to its new building west of the city limits on Grand River near Gill Road and is in full operation. Norman Lawton, president of the company, reported this week.

At first, company officials didn't expect to occupy the building, which was started last spring, until November 1.

Originators of accurate, unground form hobs which cut gears, splines and other precision tools by means of generating the company began operations in 1927 and at that time was located at 10400 Freeland in Detroit.

The company also manufactures carbide and high-speed steel milling cutters. Most of its products are used in the automotive industry, Lawton said.

All of the company's 120 employees accompanied the firm to its new location, Lawton added.

The new building occupies 25,000 square feet of area. Landscaping operations around the building are now being completed.

The church thanks the community for the cooperation given during its anniversary.

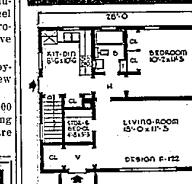
## HOLDS "BRUSH PARTY"
