

NOTICE OF THE SPECIAL ELECTION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5 FRACTIONAL OF THE TOWNSHIPS OF FARMINGTON, LIVONIA AND REDFORD, OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN

To The Qualified Electors of said School District:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a special election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid school district will be held in the Clarenceville High School, located at 20210 Middlebelt Road, in said school district, on Monday, October 29, 1951, and at such special election the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the school district.

PROPOSITION I. BONDING PROPOSITION

Shall School District No. 5 Fractional, of the Townships of Farmington, Livonia and Redford, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$700,000.00) and issue its bonds therefor for the purpose of constructing new schools and new school additions to school houses within the school district, for furnishing and equipping the same, and for acquiring and enlarging necessary school sites?

PROPOSITION II.

MILLAGE INCREASE PROPOSITION:

Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in School District No. 5 Fractional, of the Townships of Farmington, Livonia and Redford, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, for all purposes except payment of obligations incurred before December 8, 1932, be increased as provided by Section 21, Article X of the constitution of Michigan, by one and forty-five one hundredths per cent (14.5 mills) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the School District for a period of twenty (20) years from 1952 to 1971, both inclusive, to be used for the sole purpose of paying principal and interest and meeting other requirements established for payments of bonds to be issued in the aggregate principal sum of Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$700,000.00), for the purpose of constructing new schools and new additions to school houses within the school district, for furnishing and equipping the same and for acquiring and enlarging necessary school sites?

THE POLLS OF ELECTION WILL BE OPEN

FROM 7:00 A.M. TO 8:00 P.M.,

Eastern Standard Time

Each person voting on the proposition to increase the total tax rate limitation must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of Twenty-one (21) years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months, and in the School District thirty (30) days next preceding the election.

Each person voting on the proposition of borrowing money and issuing bonds, in addition to the preceding qualifications, must be the owner of property assessed for taxes within the School District, or the lawful husband or wife of such owner. Only registered electors are eligible to vote.

Mrs. Thomas Hillman of Eight Mile Road was hostess to her many friends on Wednesday evening when she had a "Better Brush" party.

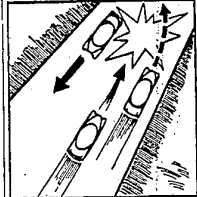
Mrs. Baine Holmes of Jefferson has taken up demonstrating "Better Brushes" in his spare time.

No. 8: Don't Pass Opposite An Oncoming Vehicle.



The old frontier sheriff was leery of a narrow canyon because he was hemmed in by the walls and could easily be "dry-gulched" and shot by some outlaw. The professional driver is likewise leery of driving into a narrow slot between two other traffic units.

On a three-lane or four-lane highway it is unwise to pass a vehicle when an oncoming car is in the middle. If either car moves over, you are a "gone-goose". You can't dodge and it's far too late for your brakes to do any good. Avoid this dangerous channel situation. Speed up and complete the pass before an oncoming car reaches the passing area, or slow down and wait for the oncoming car to go by.
