Trout planting crews have stocked Michigan streams and other wa-

ters with nearly 2,000,000 trout so far this year.

Last year 275 Michigan residents died in fires. Some 16,000 home fires caused estimated damage of \$8,000,000.

## HUNTERS ASKED TO SPARE TELEPHONE LINES

Hunters, please spare those telephone lines!

This was the appeal of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company on the opening of the 1951 hunting season.

Michigan Bell believes that many persons are not familiar with the extent of trouble that can be caused by a bullet or even a BB shot into one of its cables. A pellet need not sever the many wires inside a cable to cause extensive damage. It was pointed out, for even a small hole in a cable's lead sheath would allow water to seep in and short out circuits. Aside from the normal traffic of emergency messages, that telephone lines carry regularly, there are more calls being made in connection with national defense, and serious consequences could result if some of these were disrupted.

Prospective hunters are also reminded that it is against the law to willfully damage telephone facilities by gunfire, an offense which carries a felony charge if the damage exceeds \$50. Michigan Bell said that cable damage by bullet or buckshot usually means more than \$50 in repair expenditures.

## DORIS DIDDAMS NAMED ON "DEAN'S LIST"

One student from Farmington is included in the group of honor students named on the "Dean's List" of the Wayne University College of Liberal Arts, Dean Victor A. Rappert has announced.

The student from Farmington who attained this honor during the semester ending in June, 1951, is Doris Diddams of 2851 Sunnyside with an average of 3.5.

The College has instituted a "Dean's List" to be published semi-annually, composed of those students whose honor point average is 3.5 or above for the past semester. In order to be eligible for consideration a student must be carrying at least 12 academic

hours. The College of Liberal Arts is the only College at Wayne to issue a list of this kind. Inclusion on the "Dean's List" becomes a permanent part of the student's record.

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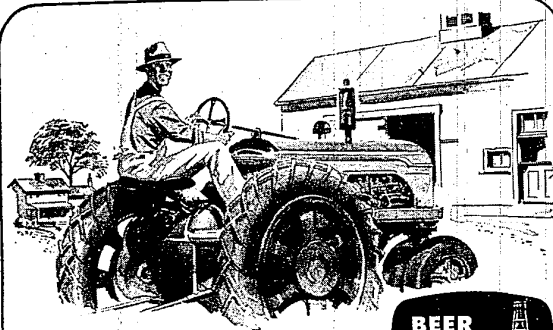

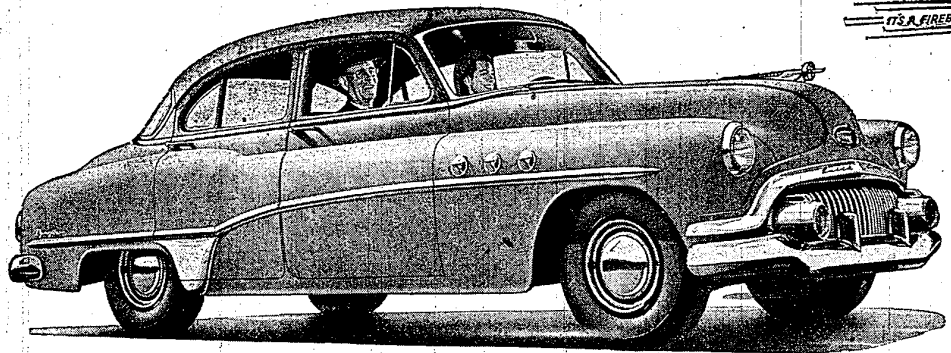
