Estimate 100,000 To Hunt During Waterfowl Season

An estimated 90,000 to 100,000 hunters are expected to take advantage of the seven full week ends included in the 1951 longer waterfowl season which gets under way at noon on October 12.

The 45-day season, 12 days longer than last year, runs through November 25. About \$1,000,000 is expected to be paid in license fees to the conservation department.

Hunters may take four ducks daily, have eight in possession. Bag limits on geese are increased to five a day, five in possession, more than last year, including not more than two Canada geese or two white-fronted geese, or one of each. Any combination of 25 American and red-breasted mergansers may be bagged in a day, with no limit to the number which may be held in possession after opening day. Daily bag and possession limit for coots continues at 10 birds.

Black Squirrels Not Legal Game In State

Black squirrels are not legal game anywhere in the state, the conservation department cautions hunters.

To clear up a misunderstanding in some areas, the department points out only fox and gray squirrels may be shot in the lower peninsula until November 5.

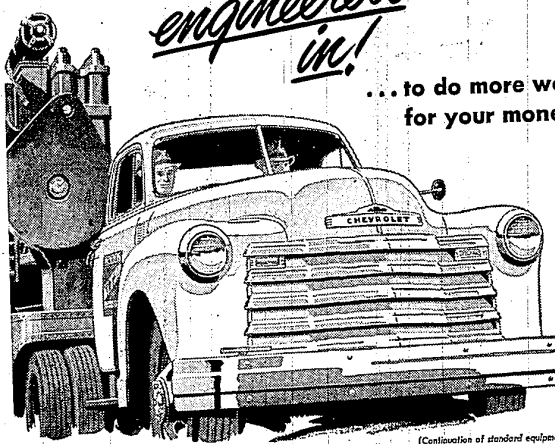

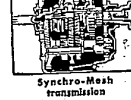

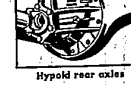
