PROVINCE OF QUEBEC
FEATURES EXCITING NEW
HUNTING AND FISHING
DOMAIN IN
DE LA VERENDRYE PARK

QUEBEC, P. Q., Oct. 30, (1951).

La Belle Province de Quebec, long famed as a sportsman's paradise, has been going through an expansion of its developed game and fishing lands in the past few years.

Quebec is bordered by five states of the U.S.A. Within 650 miles of Quebec's exciting virgin lakes and rivers some 350,000 people live.

The "Quebec habit" has been growing rapidly through the impetus lent by private enterprise and government encouragement.

The story of the tremendous growth of Quebec tourism in the past seven years might well be characterized generally by the particular example of the opening of the De La Verendrye Park area.

De La Verendrye Park is new in a sense — yet its appeal as the most exciting and best developed of Quebec's hunting and fishing domains is relatively old. These woods and lakes have always been there. Wildlife such as bear, moose, deer and game birds plenty have always roamed this portion of Quebec's 597,000 square miles of unspoiled, undulating woodlands and waterways.

However, De La Verendrye, which today encompasses some of the most comfortable sport facilities, could never have been — nor would private capital have moved into the picture — had not Quebec's Government envisioned a new playground here which will eventually enhance annual revenues to a great extent.

The main government contribution was a new road leading north of Mont Laurier, joining the famed Laurentian "Sportsman's Highway," known more precisely as Route 11. The area is situated some 225 miles north of Montreal, but the excellent road and magnificent new airstrip, makes direct travelling time for the sportsman pleasant and speedy. Montreal is only 90 air minutes from Boston and New York.

The area comprising 2,600 square miles is known as the Mont Laurier-Senneterre Fishing Reserve. Situated at Lac des Loups (Lake of Wolves) replete with beaches and cabins, main shopping centre, recreation hall, guides and nearby lakes literally teeming with Lake Trout, Muskellunge, Bass, Pickerel, and Pike. In the surrounding woodlands hunting is at its best in the fall season. Great Northern Pike and walleyed dore are also among the favorite game fish.

Indeed the Mont Laurier-Senneterre district with the beautiful De La Verendrye Park reserve, represent Quebec's sportslands at their best — a new thrill for lovers of the outdoors. Adv.
