

Naturally a great many administrative details must be worked out before the first report can be issued. Mr. Leitch is new to the community and has been given the responsibility of administering the city under an entirely new charter. However, in spite of these facts, a great deal of progress has been made.

are still some residents who question her value to the mew type of government. Mistakes have undoubtedly been made, but no one could honestly believe that they would not be made. The very fact that mistakes are made indicates that things are being tried and progress is being accomplished.

For the first time in the history of this City, all governmental administration is being coordinated. This in itself is of vital importance to every citizen. Authority and responsibility are centralized. For the first time a scientific study is being made of the extent and use of the water supply, including purity checks. Installation of parking meters has been approved, which will be of major benefit to merchants and residents as well as giving the City a source of revenue with which to improve streets and off-street parking. The police and court are being centralized in one unit and a cell block is being added which will save the taxpayers dollars, plus giving them added in one unit and a cell block is being added which will save the taxpayers dollars, plus giving them added protection. Additional free parking space has been provided and the City's Zoning and Traffic Ordinances are being brought up to date and codified.

Greater efficiency, additional service to the people and economy are essential to any good government and Farmington is headed in the right direction.

The Board has secured the site, and work should be started at once on the problems of construction. 
FIVE YEARS AGO (November 7, 1946) Break Ground For Addition
