GRF lobby "would make the lobbyists investigated by Kim Sigler look like tea parties." Said Cloon, "Put up or shut up." Poe: "The hit bird flutters." Cloon: "A lot of birds are shot illegally." And so on and on and on. But Gus Scholle, C. I. O. state president, says there might be a grand jury investigation of the GRF lobby by methods. Significant: Democrat legislators fought unsuccesssfully to defeat the one-man grand jury bill.

Michigan's farmers still pack a powerful punch in state government. Witness the atomic action bestowed upon the banning of using rifles for deer south of the Muskegon Bay City line and in the Thumb. They got results. The ban was whittled into law, even if it required a special session of the legislature.

Conservation officials previously had revealed they hadn't authority to enforce a commission ruling against rifles. Also they revealed that most previous violators had been — you guessed it, the farmers.

A new boom in copper for Michigan's upper peninsula may be on the way. The boom will be based on critical need for the metal and will center around undeveloped ore bodies.

Some 1,115 men will be called up from Michigan during December for induction into the armed forces.

Michigan teachers, long claiming that the education system is being attacked by unscrupulous forces, have their answer. Says Miss Margaret Stevenson, national education association official: "The cure . . . is closer cooperation with the public."

When the Michigan house of representatives — over Democratic objections — adopted a concurrent resolution to invite Gen. Douglas MacArthur to address the legislature, Ed Carey (D-Detroit) quipped, "I wonder when he is going to fade away." The legislature officially commended MacArthur in a concurrent resolution adopted last spring.

Farmington Man Pledged To U-M Fraternity

Fraternities at the University of Michigan pledged 499 men at the close of the fall rushing period October 14, University authorities report.

Satisfaction with the rushing season was attributed in part to a new system of helping rushees, according to Sanford R. Robertson of Wilmette, Illinois, inter-fraternity Council member.

Twenty-five fraternity men acted as unbiased rushing counselors throughout the first few weeks of school. "They attempted to eliminate confusion and misinformation in the minds of many rushees, especially those new to campus, by answering questions on scholarship standings, house activities and expenses," Robertson said.

The 43 houses participating pledged 373 freshmen, 73 sophomores, 49 juniors and five seniors along with three graduate students. Pledged from Farmington is Richard Alexander of 32043 Shawansee to Phi Delta Theta.

Attends MSC Dinner For Honor Students

Eighty-seven Michigan State College students who received an all "A" scholastic average for the spring and summer terms were honored at a dinner given by President John A. Hannah.

Topping the list, according to class groups, were the seniors with a total of 34, followed by 24 sophomores, 18 juniors and eight freshmen. Two special students also attained the high average.

Edgar P. Burgess of Farmington, a senior, received all "A's".

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Lt. Oldham Helps Set Up Postal Service

A small postal money order office has been set up about three miles behind the front lines in Korea and its operators are being kept busy by the 19th Regiment, Army authorities report.

Sgt. Allan Winneg of Brockton, Massachusetts, and Lt. Raymond Oldham, 20105 Farmington Road, Farmington, handled 5,000 money orders, totaling \$408,511.23 in September and business is increasing daily.

"American soldiers not only are the highest paid in the world," Winneg says, "but I'm beginning to think they are the thrickest."

Oldham said that many more thousands of dollars are sent home in the form of gifts. During September, 1,656 packages were handled by the office.
