Coach Harold Humble's boys finished first, second, fourth, tenth and eleventh to chalk up the win. First finishing Bob Mansfield set a new record for the two mile Farmington course in 10:51. The previous record also set by Mansfield this year was 10:56.

Finishing second was the Falcons' Jim Bryant; Mike Stanek, fourth; and Shaw, tenth, and Harrison eleventh. Pressley finished twelfth and Brunk fifteenth.

The Falcons reserved dropped the reserve match 32 to 25 to Dearborn. Sutherland took the first finishing spot.

This trip was chosen from a group of three which included trips to Niagara Falls and Washington, D. C.

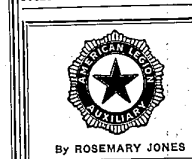

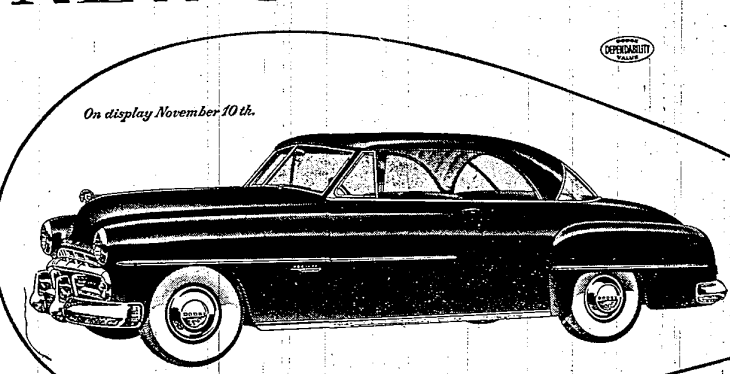
