In the fiscal year ending last June 30, Washington shelled out \$90,478,420 to Michigan residents. Veterans readjustment and vocational rehabilitation accounted for most of the money — \$77,574,097. Other returns: agriculture's soil conservation program, \$7,362,175 and new cars for disabled war veterans, \$59,754.

These amounts don't include other federal programs — research, airport expansion and building, highway development, railroads, shipping, mines, postal routes and many more too numerous to list.

Says Rep. Gerald R. Ford, Jr. (R-Mich.): The U. S. Department of Agriculture has become a political organization "bought down with bureaucracy," and seeking to control farmers. He told Kent County Farm Bureau that "the USDA now spends \$20 for every \$1 it spent 20 years ago — might better spend more money in the field and less at the top."

Arms orders continue to pour in on the auto industry but peak output is still many months away. Or-

ders total something in excess of \$5,000,000,000.

The Midwest will become a "despread area" unless the St. Lawrence seaway is built, according to Lt. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of army engineers. He echoed the argument long voiced by Michigan that the steel industry is moving east of the Appalachian mountains and that the automobile industry will not be far behind. Encouragement for the passage of the seaway bill has been received from congressmen.

The cold war is costing us twice as much per soldier as World War II. The reason: inflation and the fantastic new weapons — which have just as fantastic price tags. Cost per man is \$17,000 for a year. World War II cost, \$7,531 per man.

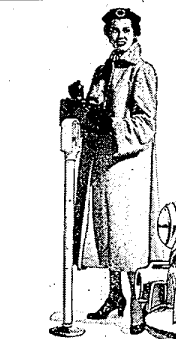
