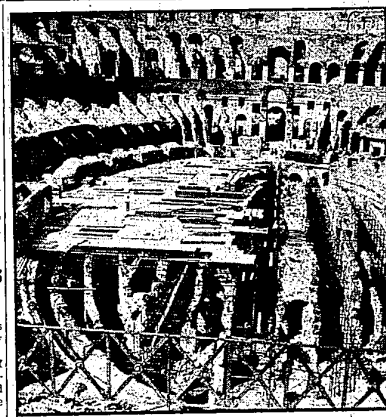

## WATCH FOR RABBIT FEVER WARNS HEALTH OFFICIAL

The open hunting season for small game should suggest to hunters caution on two counts, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, health commissioner, says. These counts are safe practices with fire arms and precautions against tularemia.

He reminds hunters that many wild rabbits have tularemia and for that reason it is best to treat all wild rabbits as though they were infected. Wear rubber gloves in cleaning and handling the game and be sure the meat is thoroughly cooked before eating or even tasting it.

The germs which cause tularemia are so small that they can get into the body through a break in the skin too small to be noticeable. Infection may enter through the mucous membranes of the eyes, nose or digestive tract. Symptoms of the disease in humans show up from four to twelve days after the germs invade the body. Chills, fever, nausea and generalized pains are the early symptoms. Lymph glands near the place where the germs entered the body may become painful and swollen.

Dr. Molner suggests the following precautions to hunters: Shoot a rabbit only if it is moving fast; one which is slow or sluggish is likely to have tularemia. Wear rubber gloves when you dress or handle a wild rabbit. Take care that the glove is not pierced by a knife or bone.

Cook the rabbit well, so that no red meat or red blood remains. Do not taste the game until it is thoroughly cooked. By cooking the meat, the germ is destroyed.

Bits of wood ticks transmit tularemia germs to rabbits. Try to avoid these insects. Do not take chances — guard yourself from tularemia.
