

## 159 Die On Michigan Highways In September

Traffic accidents in Michigan during September cost the lives of 159 persons, two more than were killed in the same month last year. Injuries and accidents also were heavy, resuming the upward trend which had been halted temporarily in August.

According to the State Police monthly statistical report, the traffic toll included 4,558 persons injured in 14,096 accidents. Injuries increased 25, or five per cent, over 4,333 in the same month a year ago and accidents increased 706, or five per cent, over 13,390.

Compared with the corresponding months of the previous year, traffic deaths have increased in all months of 1951 except April and May. Likewise, with the exception of August, injuries have been up each month since last February and accidents have been higher since May of 1950.
