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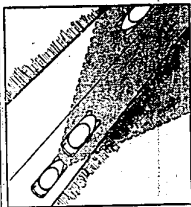

No. 10: Don't Hide Behind The Vehicle Ahead.



The over-eager driver rides right on the tail of the car he is trying to pass while he waits for a gap in oncoming traffic to give him a chance to make a run for it. In this position, he has three strikes against him. He is so close that he can't see what's coming ahead without pulling his car so far to the left as to be in a dangerous position. He is in danger of a rear-end collision if the car ahead suddenly slows down because of something ahead of it. And he has no distance in which to pick up speed and have a running start when a safe passing opportunity presents itself. The professional driver holds back where he can see better, stop better, and sprint better, when the safe moment arrives.

Universalist Church Holds Talents Ingathering Day To Boost Fund

The rebuilding program of the Farmington Universalist Church received a substantial boost Sunday, which was Talent Ingathering Day.

The time ordinarily devoted to the morning sermon was taken up by reports of members concerning the growth of the talents which they received last spring from the church.

Some 30 members reported at the service, which was presided over by the Rev. Helen Adams. The total revealed a talent increase of twenty-six fold for a net total of \$543.25, all of which was turned in to the building fund treasurer.

On the basis of this underwriting, Mr. Hulett, the building committee chairman, was authorized to proceed with certain extra improvements that had not been contemplated in this year's budget. Mr. Hulett reported at the annual meeting Sunday that the extensive remodeling project at the church would now include the immediate erection of a pillared porch, which will enhance the dignified lines of the building, the oldest house of worship in Farmington.

A standing vote of thanks and a formal congratulatory motion, were accorded Mr. Hulett by the congregation.

Mr. Hulett was succeeded as president of the board of trustees by Dr. Russell T. Costello but agreed to continue for another year as chairman of the building committee.

Dr. Frank D. Adams, the minister, suffered a broken hip November 7 and hence was unable to be present at the report on the talents, which he had originated in the spring. The congregation was informed that he would not be able to stand in the pulpit for about three months but might attend services in a wheel chair before that time.

At the annual meeting, which followed the parish fellowship dinner in Adams Hall, Mrs. Harley Gibson was re-elected secretary; Alfred Smith, as treasurer, and Miss Elizabeth Elz as trustee. Chester E. Downing was elected vice-president of the board.

The talent ingathering produced several highly unusual explanations of increases. One parishioner, an ordained minister, vouched for the story that his talent multiplied twenty-fold by what appeared to be a miracle or at least magic. Another parishioner admitted having matched pennies for part of the talent yield, but the end was ad-

judged as having justified the means.

Miss Marion Kellogg, who donated a sizeable part of the \$5,000 she received last summer in a contest of skill, reported that the junior church, of which she is superintendent, now has an enrollment of 22.

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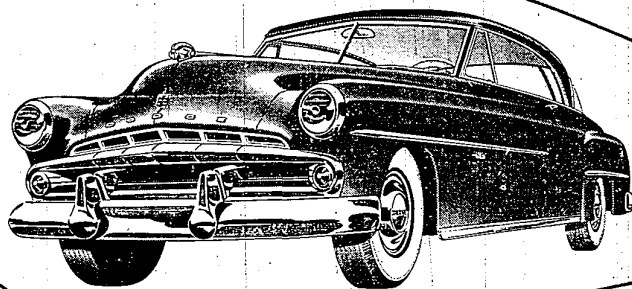
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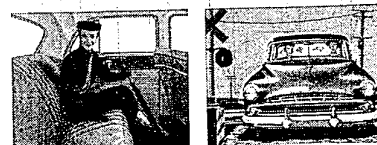
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
