## A Huge Kitchen.

It is believed that the largest kitchen in the world is that of the Bon Marche, in Paris. It provides food for all the employees of the house, 4,000 in number. The smallest kettle holds 75 quarts, the largest 375 quarts. There are fifty frying pans, each of which is capable of holding 300 outlets at a time or frying 230 pounds of potatoes. When there are omelets for breakfast 7,800 eggs are used. The coffee machines make 750 quarts of coffee daily. There are sixty cooks and 100 kitchen boys employed.
