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\$1,750,000 worth of bonds will have to be completed before the high school building can be finished. Approval for the sale of the bonds must be secured from the Michigan Finance Commission. At the present time \$300,000 worth of bonds have been sold.
Initial plans call for the construction of a new 22 room high school building to be built on the north side of Shawanawasee Street just west of Orchard Lake Road. The site for the new building contains approximately 42 acres.

quire that sidewalks shall be constructed, rebuilt or repaired along either of both sides of a street or any part of a street. Within 5 days following the date of passage of the resolution, written notice must be given to the owners notifying them of the resolution. Owners then have 30 days to construct, rebuild or repair the sidewalks in accordance with the resolution.
If the owner or owners refuse or neglect to comply, the city has the authority to have the work done, and the cost charged back to the owner or owners as a special assessment. All cross walks shall be constructed and kept in repair by the city under the direction of the city manager.

SIDEWALK CLEANING

The second ordinance approved by the Council governs the cleaning of all sidewalks of snow, ice, mud and other obstructions. The ordinance makes the owner, in the case of vacant property, the tenant, lessee or occupant of property responsible for the cleaning of all sidewalks adjacent to or abutting upon his property. If any owner, tenant, lessee or occupant refuses or neglects to keep any sidewalk cleaned for a period of 24 hours or more the city may have the sidewalk cleaned and the cost charged to the person who refused or neglected to comply with the ordinance.

January 21 has been set as the date for a public hearing on the vacating of the south 50 feet of a dead alley running south from Oakland Avenue parallel to the Village Street. The request to have the alley vacated was presented by Curt Hall, one of the two property owners involved. He stated that the alley was owned by E. B. Wolfe, had also consented to vacate the south end of the alley vacated. It was pointed out that the alley is dead end and is not wide enough to allow for a turn-around.

TAX STATEMENTS TO BE MAILED TO OWNERS NEXT WEEK

Tax bills on approximately 11,000 individual lands will be mailed to property owners in Farmington Township next week. Clayton Goers, Township Treasurer, reported Tuesday. Bills are payable the latter part of next week. Goers stated.
Assessed valuation of \$9,067,839 is up \$327,295, Goers reported. Last year's assessed valuation was \$8,740,543. The increase in assessed valuation is attributed to new business buildings, homes and the transformation of acreage into two new subdivisions, Goers indicated.
Deadline for payment of taxes is February 29, 1952. Taxes not paid before March 1, 1952 will be returned to the Oakland County Treasurer's office at Pontiac and four per cent penalty will be automatically added. An interest rate of one-half of one per cent of the tax is charged for each month the delinquent tax remains unpaid. Delinquent taxes are paid at the County Treasurer's office.
