An average of the midsemester marks of the above college freshmen indicates the following grades in various courses: Biological Science, C; Botany, B; Chemistry, C+; Drama, C; Education, C; Effective Living, B-; English, C+; French, B; Geography, C; Geology, C+; German, C; Glee Club, B; History, D+; Home Economics, C; Mathematics, C+; Philosophy, A; Spanish, C+; and Zoology, D.

A summation, not an average, of

the marks shows four A's, 16 B's, 23 C's; three D's and two E's.

Of the items discussed during the conferences the following seemed to be troubling the greatest number of students:

1. The problem of budgeting time and developing good study habits.

2. The problem of seeking assistance from professors and consultants.

3. The problem of adjusting to college teaching methods, and becoming oriented to college life in general.

Comments made by college students might prove to be enlightening. A few of them were:

1. "Teach us note taking, outlining — in general, how to study."

2. "Students going to college should have a science, preferably with laboratory work."

3. "I wish I had taken typing."

4. "I'm not blaming my high school teachers, but I wish now that I had done more outside reading."

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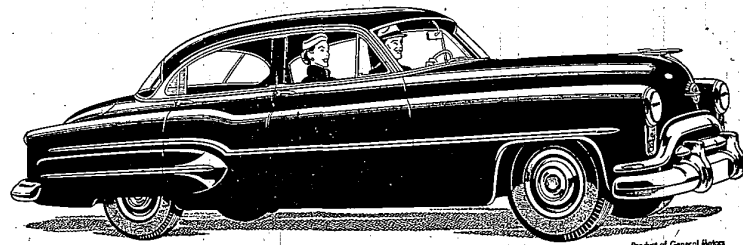

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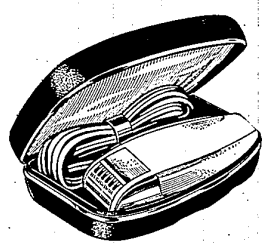
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
