Trojan Reserves Lose In Overtime

The Clarenceville reserve basketball team was defeated in an exciting overtime contest by Clarkson 28 to 27. This marked the second time in a week that the reserves have been beaten by one point. Clarkson won the game after three minutes had elapsed in the overtime on a foul shot which was made by Thayer.

In the first period, Clarenceville outscored Clarkson 7 to 4, with Myers, Merriams and Robbins doing the scoring. Clarenceville added eight points to their lead in the second period, while holding Clarkson to one point. The score at the end of the first half was 15-5. Myers scored seven of the fifteen points while fouling out late in the second period.

The third period found Clarenceville maintaining their lead. The Junior Trojans added seven points while Clarkson picked up six points. The score at the end of the third period was 22-11. After playing superbly in the first three periods, Clarenceville slipped badly in the last quarter. Clarkson caught fire and scored 16 points in the last period, while they held Clarenceville to 5 points. This enabled them to tie the score at the end of the regular game time at 27-27. Clarkson finally won the game in the overtime period. Clarenceville was high point man for Clarenceville with 3 points. Closely following him was Myers with 7 points. The rest of Clarenceville's scoring was by Robbins, 5; Zavitz and Killeen, 3; and Galloway, 2.
