STUDENT COURT
RULES, REGULATIONS
PUT INTO EFFECT

Student Court rules and regulations for the 1951-52 school year went into effect Monday, December 10.

The list of violations, thus far, is the same as last year. It follows:

1. Dropping papers.

2. Trespassing on private property.

3. Smoking on school grounds.

4. Eating or loitering in cars parked on the school grounds.

5. Spitting in front of the school building.

6. Wasting time between classes.

7. Eating in the locker rooms.

8. Having a messy or unlocked locker three consecutive times.

9. Destruction of school property.

10. Discourtesy and poor sportsmanship.

11. Dropping papers in Farmington business section.

12. Skipping pep meetings.

13. Creating a disturbance while in Farmington stores.

14. Creating a disturbance or behaving in an unsportsmanlike manner at any extra curricular activity.

15. Court jurors who miss three consecutive meetings can be ticketed.

16. Student Council members who miss four consecutive meetings without valid reason.

17. Punishment for violations is given at the judge's discretion. The Student Council vice-president is automatically the judge; this year it is Bob Brown. The punishments are listed as follows; however, changes may be made.

1. Picking up papers.

2. Writing themes.

3. Staying after school.

4. Being barred from extra-curricular activities.

5. Recommendation for suspension from school.

The reason for having the court is to let the students govern themselves and learn responsibility along with keeping the school clean.

The faculty and administration are backing the student court. They will take care of any person held in contempt of court.

Tickets will be given by student council members and people appointed by the council to give tickets on the buses. R. C.
