assessment in Farmington Township be instructed by the Board of Supervisors that they agree to payers the true cause for such increase is the fact that Oakland County assessments were approximately 33% below the State equalized valuations, according to the State Tax Commission, and as a result the Township was forced to raise the equalization factor to a point nearer the State Equalization pattern.
A resolution was adopted that the above information be sent to The Farmington Township Board and The Farmington Enterprise.

Clarenceville PTA Plans Christmas Party Dec. 18

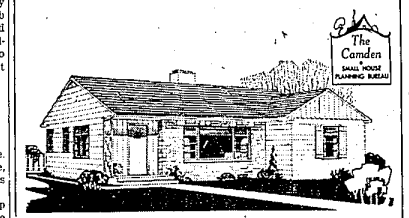
