7.5 Pct. Hike Asked At S'craft

As leaders of the faculty union watched intently, the Schoolcraft College board decided to ask the federal government's permission to give eight high-level administrators a 7.5 per cent pay hike, two per cent higher than what is normally allowed under Phase II guidelines. President C. Nelson Grote told the board that the top administrators traditionally have been given the same percentage boost as the Schoolcraft College Association of Administrative Personnel, a group of 21 mid-level administrators. SCAAP got approval from the Internal Revenue Service's Detroit office, local

agent for the Pay Board, for a 7.5 per cent boost that went into effect May 1. THE EIGHT administrators are Dr. Robert Keene, vice president for instruction; W. Kenneth Lindner, vice president for business; Edward McNelly, vice president for student affairs; Tom Adams, dean of applied sciences; Fred Stefanski, dean of arts and sciences; Jerry Munro, personnel director; Fred Petersen, business manager; and Clara Rousseau, administrative assistant to the president. They constitute the president's administrative

committee, the equivalent of a cabinet. In the audience were leaders of the Faculty Forum, bargaining agent for some 160 faculty members, counselors and assistant librarians. Their contract with the college expires Aug. 23, and negotiations have already begun. IN OTHER personnel matters, the board of trustees: • Granted a one year leave of absence to Carolyn L. Spatta, geography instructor, who plans to return to the University of Michigan to complete work on a doctorate degree.

Mrs. Spatta is president of United Schoolcraft Faculty, a union that attempted to dislodge the Faculty Forum as bargaining agent. USF was defeated by a 2-1 margin April 21 in an election. Mrs. Spatta's departure leaves vice president Angelo Chinni as head of USF - if members decide to keep it alive. • Shifted the personnel office out of the business affairs domain and attached it directly to the office of President Grote. • Changed David Heinz-

man's title from "director of public relations" to "director of college relations." Dr. Grote said this reflected Heintzman's increasing amount of work in the community. Otherwise, there is no change in work or pay. • Settled a Faculty Forum grievance by directing the union to offer another job to an auto shop instructor, who had been given a layoff notice when his job was eliminated. The board made its decision following an hour-long "executive" (closed door) session.

'Take A Test, Pass A Course' Plan Urged

Schoolcraft College is being urged to allow students to "test out" a course - that is, to give a student course credit if he can pass the final exam without taking the classwork. But there's disagreement over how much to charge for the credit. The recommendation was one of seven given the community college's board last week by its Advisory Committee for Women's Program, a group which freely roams through campus policies and procedures. Chairman is Barbara Geil, the college's director of admissions. She delivered the recommendations.

in non-traditional ways," according to the committee, and the student would be charged (tuition and given full credit if he passed the exam. Trustee Rosina Raymond, however, objected to the suggestion that full tuition be charged. She said Wayne State University charges only for the exam, a sum of \$3 or more, and grants no honor points. Trustee Mary Dumas, a member of the advisory group, said a recommendation that is particularly needed is a woman counselor who is a specialist in the technical-vocational area.

OTHER recommendations were: • "A 'continuum center' for women, Miss Geil said the committee had already consulted experts from the University of Michigan and Oakland University, where such centers are in operation. • "A career educational specialist as a consultant for the entire college community."

• Recognizing that "all people cannot be accommodated in the traditional class schedule, investigate block scheduling during the day, 'mini-courses, weekend college and 'touch-down' tutorial programs."

Dr. Grote Expands Contacts

President C. Nelson Grote is expanding his formal contacts with Schoolcraft College students. On campus less than a year, Dr. Grote has developed a reputation as an administrator who is willing to listen directly to students. He has instituted a series of once-a-month breakfasts with members of the Student Senate, but he told trustees last week that the contact is too "limited." So he is adding a "President's Council of Presidents," a group of the leaders of all clubs, fraternities and organizations on campus.

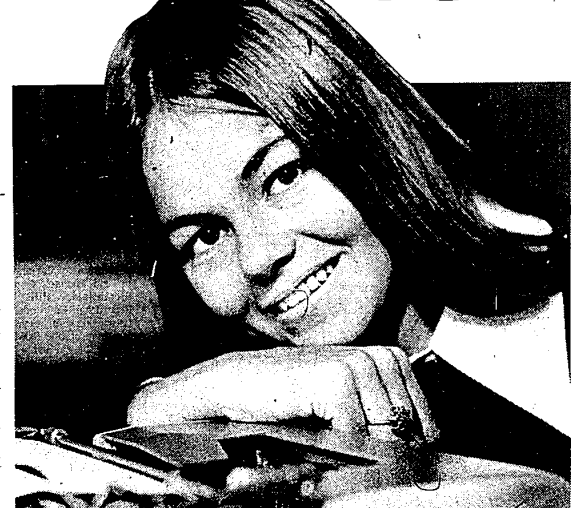
