### Coalition Plans Demonstration

The Detroit Women's Abortion Action Coalition will sponsor a demonstration on May 6 for the repeal of all anti-abortion laws, no forced sterilization and an end to restrictive contraception laws.

The demonstration will assemble in Grand Circus Park, Detroit, at 12 noon, and march to Kennedy Square for a rally at 1:30 p.m.

**THE DEMONSTRATION** will be the culmination of a week-long series of activities planned by the coalition. The speakers will include Rep. Jackie Vaughn III, a member of the Human Rights Party; Janet Wings of the West Side Mothers; a representative of the coalition; Linda Nordquist, Socialist Workers party candidate for the U.S. Senate; a representative of the Canadian Women's Abortion Law Repeal Movement; and a national staff member of the coalition.

Headquarters of the coalition is 1127 David Stott Building, Detroit.

A group of high school women are planning to challenge Michigan's contraception laws and are attempting to have the eight regional boards of education call a High School Abortion Action Day. They plan to organize discussions in the classrooms, speakers, debates and panels and to form a picket line at 3:30 p.m., May 9, in the Central Board of Education.

### Childbirth Film To Be On Television

"The Story of Eric," a film demonstrating the Lamaze method of childbirth, will be shown on Channel 56 TV at 10 p.m., Thursday, May 4. It will encorp at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, May 6.

The showing is being sponsored by the Childbirth Preparation Association of Lincoln Park and the Plymouth Childbirth Education Association.

It will be part of the show "Free Play." A Livonia couple, Al and Kathy Helner, will relate their experiences with the Lamaze method. Kay Christian and Carol Daniels, registered nurses and instructors for both groups, will be present along with Nancy Reding, president of the Lincoln Park association.

## Northwest YWCA Sets \$14,000 Campaign Goal

A \$14,000 goal has been set for a membership drive launched this week by the Northwest branch YWCA.

Mrs. Andrew Driscoll, chairman, urged campaign workers during a kickoff meeting April 28 to seek new memberships in the area surrounding the branch at 2940 Grand River, Redford Township.

"The YWCA is a great membership organization," she said.

"This year, with rising costs added to the tremendous growth we have experienced with our new swimming facility, we find ourselves with a real challenge to keep up with our budget.

"Although it is true we are a Torch Drive agency, we have always felt that we should pay part of our own way. Our

membership drive is one of the ways we accomplish this."

THE DRIVE will go on through May 15.

The yearly fee for membership in the YWCA is \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for youth. Earlier this year, the YW voted to raise the contributing membership fee to \$25 and the life membership to \$200.

"We feel a YWCA membership really is the best buy in town," said Mrs. A.D. Matheson, branch chairman, taking a cue from the membership campaign slogan.

SINCE ITS INCEPTION in an unoccupied store in Redford in 1952, the Northwest branch YW has offered a varied program of activities in the area.

Classes, thought-provoking

discussion groups, teen programs, and a schedule of activities both entertaining and informative have attracted a steady stream of women, girls, men and boys.

The branch, which offers the largest program in the Detroit metropolitan area, now has a membership of 6,925.

A NEW SWIMMING program opening May 15 for adult men, women and tots, offers instruction from novice to advanced skills.

A first this year is a synchronized swimming group, and aqua-gym, which has proved a favorite, will be repeated. Also planned are youth classes for boys and girls six to 15.

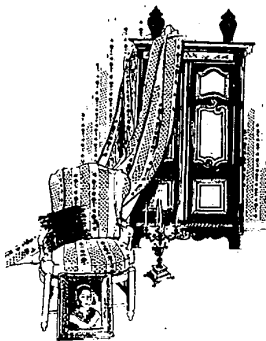
