Contest Will Name Jr. High

FARMINGTON
The Farmington Board of Education has authorized a procedure for selecting a name for the proposed fifth junior high school of Farmington Schools.

Residents, students and staff members have until May 15 to submit a suggested name or names in writing to the superintendent of schools, 32500 Shawwassee, Farmington 48024.

The school board maintains the right to make the final selection.

The new school to accommodate 300 to 1,000 students in grades seven through nine. It will be located on property about one-half mile west of Middle Belt Rd. and extending between 14 Mile Rd. on the north and Northwestern Highway on the south.

Richard Frankel of 30300 Rockshire Rd., Farmington, says he favors the city manager form of government for the proposed City of Farmington Hills.

Frankel is a candidate for charter commission in the May 18 incorporation election for Farmington Township. Nine commissioners will be elected.

Frankel, a resident of the township for 18 years, says, "I am certain that if we do not create a city at this time, our township will be fragmented by annexation attempts from neighboring communities."

"Our area is large enough to support a viable city and the time has come to create one. The next 10 years will be crucial to the development of our community. I have seen it grow from almost entirely rural to the point where there are no working farms left."
