Cairns Reveals City Positions

FARMINGTON
Floyd Cairns, Farmington Township clerk, says that if he is elected to the charter commission he will strive to bring about a charter to provide a sound base for the future city, such as tax limitation, control of special assessment districts and elections.

Cairns, a commission candidate on the May 16 ballot, has been township clerk for the past 16 years and a life-long resident of Farmington Township.

"I feel the only way to

protect the boundaries of Farmington Township and the industrial park tax base that we not only financed at great expense, but has required many years of work by the present and past administrations, is to vote 'yes' on May 16.

"If the township is fractionalized by continued annexation, the work accomplished by the planning commission and township board in drafting the present zoning ordinance and the future land use plan, which provides balanced zoning for the future, will be destroyed.

"I favor a strong council, city manager type of government with staggered terms for the council."

Cairns is past president of the Farmington Exchange Club, past director of the Michigan Township Assn., member of the legislative commission of Michigan Township Assn., and a past master of the Farmington Masonic Lodge.
