

Postal Changes Could Mean Service Cuts

A new mail processing system instituted in Farmington recently, and designed to provide more efficient and economical service, will actually result in a reduction in service unless Farmington area residents change their mailing habits. With the new area mail processing system, outgoing mail from offices including Farmington, Southfield and all other offices with the zip

code beginning 480--will be transported to a central processing plant in Royal Oak. There the mail is sorted, stamped and dispatched. These operations formerly were completed at each individual office. "There was a second handling and more expense under the previous system," explained Maurice Dever, superintendent of mail in Farmington. "We don't want to raise postal rates and this is one way of offering a more economical operation."

SINCE MAIL is dispatched unprocessed to

Royal Oak three times a day with the last dispatch on the truck at 5:30 p.m., Dever said: "We hope we can get the community retrained to deposit mail in the vicinity of 5 p.m. Businessmen should have their secretaries deposit mail at 4:45 p.m. instead of having them run down after work."

"We used to be able to collect mail at 5:30 p.m. But because all mail has to be on the truck at that time, mail must be in the box by 5 p.m.," he continued. "This is for better handling and processing."

"If it is processed later, the mail wouldn't meet flights throughout the country."

IF MAIL is deposited after 5 p.m., it will remain overnight in the boxes until the first morning pickup.

This will eliminate putting such forms as income tax returns in the mail at the last moment because they would no longer have that day's postmark.

Mail collections at the boxes will still be done by truck, and local mail going directly to Farmington residents will still be sorted and processed in the Farmington Post Office. Next day service is expected to continue under the system.

Residents must be careful.

however, to place "local mail only" in those mail boxes specifically marked for local mail. Otherwise the local mail would also be transported to Royal Oak where it would be sorted and returned to the local office by 10 p.m. "I could see where it might hinder local mail unless the public is educated to use drop boxes for Farmington," explained Bill Renee, head of Farmington's local postal union. "It's hard to say what will happen until it's been in effect for awhile. "It sounds good, but we'll try it and see. They're putting the plan into effect before they really have the machinery. It will speed up the delivery of outstate mail," he continued.

INCREASED efficiency is expected to improve mail service across the country, according to Dever.

"The area processing center has more sophisticated equipment and a more concentrated work crew. There is better productivity with no slack time. We anticipate faster mail handling."

Farmington's hours of operation and work force are being reduced because of increased efficiency of the department, according to Dever.

"We were working 24 hours a day, but now will be working from 3 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. "We will be saving in light and electricity, too."

The shortened work schedule means lobby service will also be reduced. Persons may deposit mail and check their mail boxes until 5:45 p.m. only. The lobby was formerly open until 7 p.m.

General window service will remain in operation from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. as in the past.

FOUR CLERKS are being transferred from the Farmington to the Southfield Post Office due to the new system.

"Our employees understand the situation. They know that no one will lose their jobs, but they might have to transfer."

Dever said the area mail processing system was formerly tried and tested elsewhere in the country and found more economical before being instituted here. Introduction of the system is one of the first steps in a series of planned improvements scheduled by the post office. "Right now we are devising and planning to increase service," said Dever. "We're not anticipating losing revenue. We want to get

it back in areas such as parcel post. Service is our business and we're changing our handling of parcel post." Other changes include further mechanization and revising the post office claims service which Dever describes as "good for the postal service and for the people."
