

St. Agatha First To Name Women As Commentators

Two women long active in St. Agatha Catholic Parish in Redford Township are the first in the Detroit Archdiocese to participate as commentators in the mass liturgy.

Mrs. Helen Brazzil and Mrs. Catherine Campo made their first appearances in the St. Agatha services on Ascension Day, May 11.

The Rev. John Reid, St. Agatha pastor, said they are the first women in the archdiocese to serve in the role. The Redford church has eight male commentators.

Commentators have a special place at the side of the altar during mass and read the announcements and the prayers of the day. They also lead the congregation prayers.

The new appointees will serve in that capacity about once a month.

Both have been among the most active members of the St. Agatha Women's Club. Mrs. Brazzil is immediate past president and Mrs. Campo is corresponding secretary.

A Prayer For Michigan Ruling 'Opens Door', Livonia Minister Says

(The following prayer for Michigan Week was written by Donald Liebau, Michigan Week chairman for the city of Livonia. It was distributed by Livonia Mayor Edward H. McNamara to churches in the city for use on Spiritual Foundations Day, Sunday, May 21.)

Eternal Father, we thank you for the beauty and bounty of the state of Michigan, its lakes and streams, its fields and forests, its floods and fruits. We thank you for the talents of men who have harnessed its resources and created a climate of prosperity and opportunity. In your providence, men of every race and creed have gathered here to enrich their lives, to enjoy their rights as free men, to pursue the happiness that you offer men of good will.

Bless our political leaders, our civil servants, all who labor for the common good, health and welfare of others, that they may serve in wisdom and integrity. Protect our homes and families, deepen the love of man and wife, let that love nourish their children and be to all the world the sign of your unfailing covenant with man.

Humbly we acknowledge our faults; we ask your help to level the walls of racial bias that divide us, to open our hearts and hands to the

The U.S. Supreme Court decision that the Amish people do not have to send their children to public schools is hailed by a Livonia minister as one that will lead to wider religious freedom.

The Rev. William C. Lindholm of Holy Cross Lutheran Church had followed the court case carefully because he has long been in the forefront of those helping the Amish maintain their old-fashioned way of life.

"This decision is not just for the Amish," he said. "It's for religious freedom for all."

Pastor Lindholm said the decision "opens the door for people to act on their religious beliefs."

"That decision meant that an individual could act his belief," Pastor Lindholm said. "This opens a broader base. It gives people the chance to base their life style on their religious principles so long as they do not harm others."

PASTOR LINDHOLM said he considered the most heartening part of the long opinion accompanying the 7-0 decision was a statement from Justice William O. Douglas. He quoted the justice as saying:

"What we do today opens the way to give organized religion a broader base than it has ever enjoyed."

PASTOR LINDHOLM, who came to Holy Cross two years ago, became interested in the Amish cause when he was serving a pastorate in northern Michigan about 15 years ago.

Conversations with members of the sect convinced him then they deserved support in their wish to keep their young people from the worldly contacts they would get in high school and in their contention that the high school learning was not necessary to their way of life.

He gave leadership to the National Committee for Jewish Religious Freedom, which began legal proceedings in 1968 on behalf of three Amish fathers of New Glarus, Wis., who refused to send their children to high school.

The Supreme Court decision Monday was the culmination of those proceedings.

University of Michigan students will be able to major in Judaic studies under a new program being worked out by the university with help from the Jewish Community Foundation of United Jewish Charities.

A foundation grant of \$40,000 over three years was announced by the university and the two organizations.

It will permit employment of an assistant professor of Jewish history, so that subject matter may be added to Hebrew, Talmudic literature, Israeli politics and government and Jewish political and social thought. Some 15 courses now are offered.

University officials said there had been considerable interest in a major in Judaic studies among both Jewish and non-Jewish students.
