She Changes Her Mind--And Wins

Margaret McLeod is a blond pixyish mother of four who has changed her mind about a lot of things.

She used to paint everyday things in an everyday way. Her mother liked them. Today she sees art as an exciting challenge of new forms, new techniques, and new successes. Her mother doesn't like her paintings any more, but a lot of other people, including jurors, do.

MRS. McLEOD is a Livonia resident, who took two first place awards in two different art shows, plus an honorable mention, in one weekend last month.

In the Three Cities Art Club contest held in Plymouth, Mrs. McLeod won first place in graphics.

In the Farmington Artists Club's semi-annual exhibit, Mrs. McLeod took first place in sculpture and an honorable mention in the oil painting category.

This was her first attempt at both graphics and sculpture. Her only previous award came for an oil portrait of a young boy she entered in the Farmington club's show last fall, right after joining the club.

"It seems like I was painting in a closet," says Mrs.

McLeod. "Now the whole world has opened up to me." This is evident in her work—it's so varied.

THE WORLD began opening up for Mrs. McLeod about three years ago, when she thought about going back to school.

It was her husband, Hillary, a Dell Publishing Co. sales representative, who forced her into it by telling all her in-laws that she was going back to school.

She has been attending part-time and is a little apologetic that she's only a sophomore. But she plans to keep on studying and some day hopes to go to the University of Michigan.

AT ONE TIME, there were three McLeods enrolled at Schoolcraft. Mrs. McLeod and her son and daughter. Her son is still there taking accounting, and her daughter is now working in a Farmington nursing home. Another son and daughter are in elementary and high school.

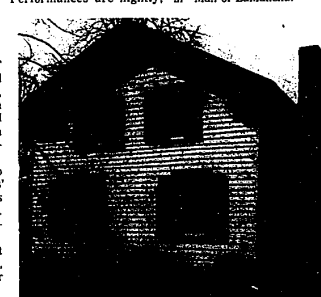
Star Theater Opens June 6
