Wouldn't it be more prudent to merely resurface it or make it three lanes and spend the remainder to upgrade adjoining roads such as Ann Arbor Trail, Hix, Haggerty, Warren, etc?

I know the highway department does not consider a three lane road safe, but how about Ford Road - a major artery - which runs from two to five lanes at various points? The roads in western Wayne County are a disgrace! First priority should be elimination of all dirt roads which contribute so heavily to pollution.

The greatest need for widening is between Sheldon and Lillie. But we need five lanes (at great expense and a lengthy construction period) when those five would not only become two again east of the expressway?

When will the Road Commission become realistic? The beautiful expense of concrete on Haggerty between Ann Arbor Rd. and Joy is a prime example of county bureaucracy, built at enormous expense for one concern.

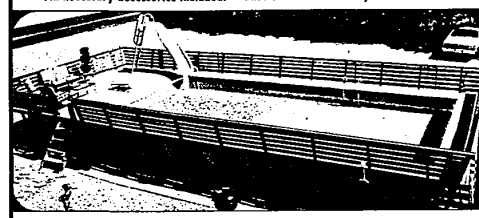
