

It's Wayne vs Farmington In Finale

It's Wayne Memorial and Farmington High in the Les Anders baseball tourney championship. Wayne knocked off Bishop Borgess behind the no-hit pitching of Art Mach, 4-0, and Farmington topped Stevenson, 5-2, in semifinal action.

The tourney finale is set for Tuesday (June 6) at 7:30 p.m. at Livonia Ford Field, and Wayne has to be the favorite.

The Inter-Lakes' Falcons were 5-4 in league action and stand 9-7 overall and are still alive in the state baseball tourney. Farmington meets

Garden City East on Saturday in a district semifinal.

FARMINGTON crushed Bentley in the first round of the Les Anders and zipped by John Glenn. Then it was a romp over Stevenson and now its the final against Wayne.

Meanwhile Wayne nipped Farmington Harrison, 3-1, toppled Thurston, and surprised Bishop Borgess to make its way into the finals.

Borgess ran into some tough luck and a pitcher named Mach in the semifinals. The Wayne right-hander came about as close as you can to throwing a perfect game.

He allowed one runner to reach first and that was Paul Banion in the second inning on a walk. Otherwise it was all Mach who chalked up 12 strikeouts.

The one anxious moment in his no-hitter came in the top of sixth with Mike Milosch lining a hot shot to Emmet Hannon at second. The Wayne second baseman made a diving catch and threw out Milosch and the rest was easy for Mach.

The rest of the tough luck that Borgess Coach Jim Birskey ran into was the absence of his two top ball players. His leading batsman in Paul Davis (.365) and top hurler in Reese Dobrick were nowhere to be seen at the start of the game.

Come the fourth inning, both arrived after encountering car trouble while out at the lake over the holiday but the damage was done.

WAYNE SCORED two off Borgess pitcher Gary Percha in the third inning. With one out, Mike MacGregor and Harold Durrie drew bases on balls and scored on a triple by Mach who was cut down at the plate attempting to score.

Wayne added two in the fifth on a walk to Hannon and singles by Durrie and Mach and the rest of the show belonged to Mach with a no-hitter to his credit.

The second contest pitted Stevenson against Farmington with Falcon Jim Harte going against Spartan Nelson Cady.

STEVENSON STRUCK first in the opening inning. After two outs, Mike Tressler tripled and scored on an error by Farmington catcher Tony Wenson.

The fifth inning belonged to Farmington with the Falcons pushing across their entire output on three hits with the help of two Spartan errors.

All five runs were unearned but Falcon Coach Richard Roy wasn't complaining.

With one out, Mark Love and Jeff Herman singled, Dennis Detrich and Dennis Hagen were safe on errors and Bob Holton filed to center for the second out.

But Mike Flynn kept Farmington alive and all but killed Stevenson with a three run round tripper to put the Falcons up, 5-1.

STEVENSON CAME BACK in the bottom of the stanza with leadoff back-to-back triples by

Bob Bialy and Don Finn for one run but Harte bore down and struck out the next three Spartans to halt the threat. Stevenson just couldn't get rolling again with the five run inning leading to the Spartan downfall.

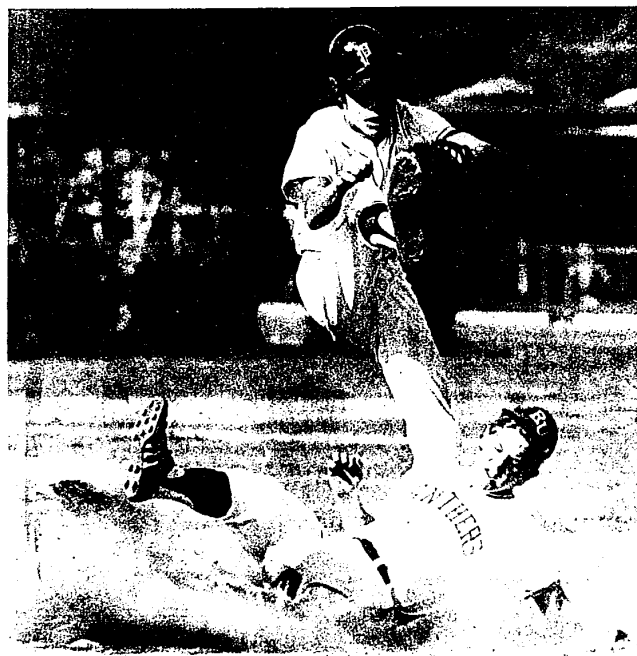
Harte went the distance for Farmington, allowing seven hits, striking out 10 and walking two. Cady and Tom Centers worked for Stevenson with the starter Cady taking the loss.

Redford Union has been knocked out of state tournament baseball action but the Panthers are alive and doing fine in the Suburban Eight conference.

Going into the final week, RU, Belleville and Edsel Ford all shared 8-4 league marks and RU closes the season with games with each.

RU tipped Plymouth, 2-0, for its eighth league win but fell to Detroit Cady in a pre-district contest, 8-7.

It was junior lefthander Tom Nippa who kept the Plymouth bats in check with only two hits. Both came off the stick of Larry Graves who collected lead-off singles in the second and seventh innings. Otherwise it was all Nippa.

JOHN OWENS hurled for Plymouth and pitched a good game except for one little mistake and that being one that has plagued him the entire season -- the gopher ball.

In the bottom of the fourth, Steve Friedman singled and Mark Yurchuck blasted his third round tripper and that's all RU needed to get by the Rocks who stand 5-7 in the conference and 7-11 overall, but the Rocks do have one force in one run and then walked Owchinko to bring in

another. Coach Atkins had seen enough and brought in reliever Tom Miller.

On the first pitch, Scott Dresser blasted a grand slam to left center and it was 7-2 Cady.

The Panthers didn't say die and came back with two of their own in the fifth. Friedman walked and moved up on a single by Robb and Mike Johnston was safe on a fielder's choice with Ron and Friedman singled to fill the bases.

Fritz drew a base on balls to force in Robb and Mike Johnston was safe on a fielder's choice with Ron and Friedman both scoring and that's how it ended, 8-7.

GLENN RICHMOND then tripled and Lupe Bravo singled to slice the margin to three runs.

St. Agatha dropped out of the state baseball tournament with a 3-2 loss to St. Ladislaus and the Aggies finished with a 6-11 overall mark.

SENIOR MARK MIRON hurled for the Aggies and gave up seven hits, struck out three and walked one in taking the loss.

The Aggies scored in the opening inning to take a 1-0

lead. Mike Barden singled, Tom Nemes singled and Pat Brown drove in Barden with the first tally.

St. Agatha went up by two in the third on a two-bagger by Rich Kayfex and a single by Barden.

ST. LADISLAUS struck with one run in the third, fifth and seventh innings to score a pre-district win and knock St. Agatha out of the running.

Bishop Borgess Wins Catholic Track Title

A year can make a lot of difference. If you are dubious, then ask Coach Steve Strauch of Bishop Borgess High who saw his team weather a

disqualification in the mile relay and then win the 440 relay, the final event of the afternoon, to capture the Catholic League's first division championship by a margin of five points over De Purrex.

Competing at Brother Rice, Borgess wound up with 44 points against 39 by De Purrex, which recently won the state Class C crown.

Just one year ago, Borgess lost the championship by a half-point to Brother Rice. This time Borgess wound up sixth with 16 points. U of D was third with 31 followed by Shrine 22 and Divine Child 18 to mention the leaders.

Borgess won the 880-relay but was disqualified for running out of its lane. The error cost six valuable points and placed the new champions in a spot where they had to take the 440-relay, the final event of the day.

THE QUARTET that was clocked in :44.0 was composed of Neil Falls, Kevin Klein-

smith, Tim DeBeiso and Greg Battle.

It was one of four individual titles taken by Borgess. Battle took the low hurdles in :20.8 and finished second in the 100-yard dash. Shawn McCarthy won the long jump with a leap of 207 3/4 inches. Dennis Cummings accounted for the fourth first when he took the pole vault with a height of 12'6".

Actually Battle was timed at :10.2 in the century, the same clocking as Divine Child's Oscar. The only difference was that the placing judges gave them to Oscar and second place to Greg.

PAT DAVEY, the son of State Boxing Commissioner Chuck Davey, accounted for the lone title for Brother Rice when he won the two mile race in 9:45.0. Brother Rice picked up its remaining points on Kevin Callaghan, second in the high jump; a fifth by Doug Pracher in the shot put; a fourth by Callaghan in the 880, a third by Mike Mathews in the mile.

Borgess scored in the following manner, excluding the four firsts; Battle second

in 100; Dennis Hicks, third in high hurdles; fifth in mile 880; Dan Madden, fourth and relay; Keith Burke, fifth in Jim Bearden, fifth in two high jump; and Rick Cudini, mile; Mack Sopko, third in second in shot put.
