

# Senior Adults Will 'Sexuality' Seminar Have Camp

The Jewish Community Center will offer three one-week sessions at the Butzel Conference Center near Ortonville for senior adults.

The first week, beginning July 31, will be a vacation week; the second, Aug. 7, a seminar week; and the third, Aug. 14, a combination week.

The Conference center is located in the heart of 3,000 acres of wooded recreation area. Each guest house includes bedrooms with twin beds and a private bath. All rooms are heated and air-conditioned.

Registration for center members is open now and will be open for non-members on June 12. The center is located at 18100 Meyers, Detroit.

The center will also offer a senior adult holiday week program, four one-week sessions of activities in and around the city. These begin July 3, and the programs will be from Monday through Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., and Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

The Detroit Catholic Youth Organization and the Archdiocesan Family Life Bureau will sponsor a seminar on "Sexuality and Human Relationships" from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m., Sunday, June 11, in St. Beatrice Catholic Church, 17235 Mt. Vernon, Southfield.

Dr. and Mrs. William Anderson and Mr. and Mrs. John Paoennessa will be the speakers, along with one or two other young couples. Dr. Anderson is a gynecologist and obstetrician. Paoennessa is a certified marriage and family counselor, and Mrs. Paoennessa is a family life instructor.

Attendance will be limited to 40 young adults, ages 18-21. They do not have to be married or engaged.

Discussions will deal with anatomy and physiology, the expectations of men and women in their relationships with each other and the economic, physical and sociological conditions which confront young married couples.

This is a pilot program. If it is successful, it will be repeated throughout the archdiocese.

The idea was developed by Ed Roberge, director of the youth leadership division of the CYO, and Fred Stone, director of the bureau. They have selected a committee of young Catholic adults to help set up the program. They will meet later with the speakers to review the presentation, to see how it may be improved and to decide whether further presentations will be beneficial.
