Suzanne Campbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Campbell of Farmington, was the first of an anticipated 15 contestants to enter the Miss Oakland County Pageant to be held June 25 in conjunction with the Oakland County Fair.

The fair, held annually on the CAI grounds on Williams Lake Road, Waterford Township, opens June 21.

The winner will receive a \$500 savings bond. The first runner-up will receive a \$100 bond; second runner-up, a \$50 bond; and third and fourth runners-up, \$25 bonds.

The winner will enter the Miss Michigan Scholarship Pageant to be held in Muskegon, and the state winner will compete in the Miss America Pageant in Atlantic City, N.J., in September, 1973.

Judges for the Miss Oakland Pageant will be Sheri Selber, a former Miss Oakland County Queen; Billie S. Farnum, former 19th district congressman; Herbert Colley, administrative assistant to the Pontiac chief of police, and Mike Kenny from WXYZ TV.

She is assigned nationally to political campaigns and she encourages women to become politically active. She is also affiliated with NOW, the National Women's Political Caucus, the Democratic party, the NAACP, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, National Economic Rights, ACLU, Common Cause and Women United for ERA.

Mrs. Paller is the American

affairs chairman of the national board of Pioneer Women. She is one of eight delegates who represented Pioneer Women at the World Zionist Congress in Israel in January.
