

OC Commission Race Has Only 1 Incumbent

FARMINGTON Several political contests have developed in the four Oakland County Commission districts which include parts of the Farmington area.

Reapportionment of county districts this year left the Farmington area with portions of four districts instead of two.

ONE INTERESTING contest will be in District 27 which includes all of the City of Farmington, six precincts in southern Farmington Township, and one precinct in the City of Southfield.

In the 27th District Wilbur Brotherton and August Barbick have both filed as Republicans with William Hutton being the lone Democrat filing.

Brotherton, of 2622 Beacon Dr., is mayor of the City of Farmington and seems to have made few enemies during his tenure.

Barbick, of 33744 Schulte Dr., City of Farmington, has long been active in the Farmington Jaycees and can be expected to have the support of many members.

Hutton, of 34525 W. Nine Mile, Farmington Township, is president of the township's ad hoc sidewalk committee and former president of the Farmington Township and Road and Civic Assn.

PAT NOWAK of 33741 W. 12 Mile, Farmington, is facing opposition from four other Republicans in the run-off for commissioner in the newly created 25th District.

The 25th District includes the north-central part of Farmington Township, southwestern portion of West Bloomfield Township, Wolverine Lake Village, Commerce Township and part of White Lake Township.

Nowak is a former president of the Farmington Jaycees and Michigan Jaycees, and a past vice-president of the U.S. Jaycees. His Republican opposition comes from Walled Lake, Michigan and Milford.

The other Republican candidates in the 25th District are: Margaret Stevenson, 418 Wolverine Dr., Walled Lake; Edward J. Holmes, 604 Commercial, Union Lake; Frank Marotta, 1847 Commerce Rd., Milford; and Lester H. Maynard, 1841 Hollingsworth, Walled Lake.

Democrats filing in the 25th are Margaret M. Gelinas of 1400 Sunset Dr., Walled Lake, and Jack D. Rose of 700 Bogie Lake Rd., Milford.

IN THE 15TH county district, four Republicans will face a run-off in the Aug. 8 primary with only one Democrat filing to oppose the GOP winner in November.

The 15th District covers the northeast section of Farmington Township including the Village of Wood Creek Farms, Franklin Village, Bingham Farms, the western half of the City of Southfield, the western edge of Beverly Hills, and the southern portion of Bloomfield.

Southfield City councilman Neil Wallace Jr., of 28300 W. Kalamit Rd., appears to be the front runner in this race.

Other Republican candidates are: E. Marshall Greene of 27170 Skye Dr., West, Farmington Township; Joseph W. Roberts of 23435 Berg Rd., Southfield; and Lillian V. Moffitt of 6828 Cathedral, Birmingham.

The Democrat running in the 15th District is Elliott H. Bank of 23365 Franklin.

LEW L. COY, incumbent Republican commissioner from Wixom, is the only Republican to file in the 24th District while four Democrats will face a run-off on Aug. 8.

The 24th includes the Village of Quakertown; central, west and northwestern portions of Farmington Township; Novi, Walled Lake, Wixom, Novi Township, South Lyon, Lyon Township and part of Northville.

Democrats filing in the 24th include: John M. Gillis of 1956 Hopkins Dr., Wixom; Glenn R. Betts of 22424 Heatherbrae Way, Novi; Benjamin Bunde Jr., of 1003 W. Maple, Walled Lake; and William R. O'Brien of 41131 S. McMahon Circle, Novi.

Deadline to register for the Aug. 8 primary is 8 p.m. July 7.

YMCA Offers Swim Lesson

Several residents and YMCA members of Farmington, West Bloomfield and Northville have offered their residential swimming pools for use by the Farmington Area YMCA.

The YMCA has scheduled lessons and is registering youngsters ages three and up, boys, girls, and adults, for swimming instruction.

Enrollment forms can be picked up at the YMCA office on Grand River near Haggerty. Each session will run for two weeks with eight lessons guaranteed.

THE LENGTH of each class is an hour except for junior lifesaving which is two hours. The adult class will be held three nights a week for 90 minutes. Cost per session is \$8 except for junior lifesaving which is \$15.

A YMCA membership is also required at these rates: youth, \$10; adult, \$15; family, \$25.

The four sessions will be June 26 to July 7, July 10-21, July 24 to Aug. 4, and Aug. 7-18, covering seven different locations throughout the Farmington area.

Carolyn Bridges of Farmington is the instructor. She is both a YMCA instructor and a Red Cross Water Safety instructor and has taught swimming at Oakland University for Clarkson Schools.

CLASSES being offered include:

- Tiny Tot I (three and four year-olds with parent);
- Tiny Tot II (four and six year-olds without parent);
- Tadpole (rank beginners) to overcome any fear of water and teach beginning skills;
- Minnow (advanced beginner) to teach child to put face in water and swim less than 20 feet, teach floating, crawl stroke and breathings;
- Fish (intermediate), child can swim 25 feet, teach endurance, crawl stroke, and backstroke;
- Flying Fish (advanced intermediate), teach distance swimming, sidestroke and frog kick;
- Shark (advanced) teaches back crawl, lifesaving stroke, breaststroke and distance swim;
- Porpoise (advanced) teaches endurance swimming, lifesaving strokes, and diving;
- Speed swimming and beginning diving;
- Junior lifesaving (strong swimmer 11-15 years-old) YMCA and Red Cross certification;
- Ladies Class (all levels) beginning and advanced instruction as a group and with individual attention;
- Adult Class (all levels) beginning and advanced instruction as a group and with individual attention.

that she had brought such a motion before the board a year ago.

"We seem to be disagreeing, but we're all agreeing that we should have open study sessions," said Mrs. Brennan. The referral was defeated 4-3.

VAGNOZZI then moved to amend the original motion by deleting the sentence forbidding public participation at open meetings, and the amendment was supported by Ross. "There should be some public participation at some point," explained Vagnozzi.

"That sentence is needless, and it's not a board meeting is held just to conduct business," he stated.

The amendment was defeated.

Finally, Ross moved to refer the motion to an "executive" session of the board as a whole, including the new member and it was approved 6-1.

member should take action with careful consideration going to the language of the resolution.

Kenneth Perrin, board vice president, said that although he was "basically opposed" to open meetings, he believed Mrs. Stirling's resolution may be acceptable.
